ne trip to the airport that Tim Schultz, owner of T & T Airport Service, is really looking forward to is when he goes to meet his brother, Jeff Schultz, arriving from Park Rapids, Minn., at the end of November.

"Jeff is coming to stay until April, and as in the past seven years, he's bringing his talents as Spray N Roll Painting back to the neighborhood. Since he's been visiting, Jeff has painted dozens of homes in Las Sendas and around the area. He's actually almost booked up



already until the first of the year because of his reputation for meticulous indoor and outdoor painting," Tim said.

Tim has great praise for his brother's work. "He gives free estimates and every job is guaranteed. He starts with pressure washing, lets it dry well, and then does the painting. He also stains decks and woodwork."



Apple Fritters

2 Eggs 1/4 Cup Milk

Oil for frying

1 Cup Flour 1/2 tsp Ground Cinnamon 1/2 tsp Salt 2 tsp Baking Powder 2 tsp Lemon Juice 3 - 4 Apples, Peeled & Diced 2 Tbsp Sugar



1 Cup Confectioners' Sugar 1 Tbsp Water

Whisk dry ingredients together. In a separate bowl, add lemon juice and apples. Add sugar and eggs together in stand mixer with paddle attachment. Fold in dry ingredients. Add milk and stir, fold in apples.

Fill frying pan with oil and heat to 375 degrees. Drop batter into oil 1/4 cup at a time. Flip and fry other side. You will know they are done by inserting a small knife into the center and it comes out clean. Use slotted spoon to remove. Let cool and top with glaze.

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

Why Consider Hormone Replacement?

BUYING AND SELLING HOMES VIRTUALLY

he coronavirus pandemic has made buying and selling a home virtually so much easier than it was before. The technology we are all using today gives us the tools to be able to do everything remotely.



Digital communication,

from video calls to virtual tours, has never been easier. Even when life goes back to normal, this technology is going to stay and continue to grow, especially in real estate.

Over the past nine months, I have had the opportunity to do many virtual purchases and sales. This is so beneficial to my clients, especially those out-of-state, that I wanted to share a little bit about the process.

OUT-OF-STATE BUYERS

It's nothing new for buyers to start their search online, but more out-of-state buyers are choosing to do the entire purchasing process virtually with little to no in-person

Four of my last five buyers were out-of-state. Our first conversation was done via Zoom or Facetime. I not only wanted to know what their wish list was for a new home but what was important to them in a community, and how to prioritize what they were looking for. I got to understand what they were looking for in their new home and neighborhood, and they got to meet me, ask me questions about our real estate market and my local expertise, to know if I was the right agent to represent them.

Once I had all their criteria, I set them up on an automatic search. As we know, homes are literally flying off the shelf right now. Many, especially the lower to middle price ranges have multiple offers on the first day. This is another advantage of doing showings virtually — we don't have to

wait to meet up in person and maybe miss our opportunity to even submit an offer.

Being a local agent, I was able to view the homes within hours. Scheduling a time to do a live virtual tour with my client is the next best thing to them being here in-person; they still got to go through the home with me seeing everything I see, they got a feel for the flow and the layout, and could ask questions as we went through

After getting an offer accepted, we were then in the 10-day inspection period. This is when two of my clients flew out to be at the inspection and view the home for the first time. My other two clients did the inspection virtually and we face-timed them through the review with the inspector while walking virtually through the house. The buyer was able to ask questions directly to the inspector and the inspector was able to show them anything he needed to explain.

If the seller had agreed to do any repairs, I ensured they were all done correctly and I did a final walk through with my clients via Facetime, Zoom or other apps. The title company arranged a notary to do the signing in whichever state my clients live, at a time convenient for



them. My hands-on approach, combined with the technology, makes anything possible.

OUT-OF-STATE SELLERS

Four of my recently sold homes have also been sold virtually. Two clients were in Canada and they stayed home throughout the selling process. As soon as they decided to sell, I started getting the home ready. This included staging the home, moving their own furnishings around and providing some of my own staging items to make the home show its best.

My handyman did any repairs needed, I arranged a carpet cleaner, landscaper, cleaners and anything else that was needed to sell the home for top price. The professional photographer did photos and, on one of the larger homes, did aerial drone photos and a live video tour.

With buyers looking for homes online and buying them sight unseen, it is so important to provide as much online and virtual viewing of your home as possible.

Once an offer was accepted and if any repairs were needed, I arranged all the details with a handyman or professional contractor. If the homes were fully furnished, I arranged to have personal items shipped back to the sellers or assisted with the sale or donation of the home

Whatever the clients need, my team and I can take care of everything so that the process is as stress free as possible. Also, know that virtual buying and selling with limited contact is not only available to out-of-state buyers and sellers. I offer all the same services to clients who live right here in Arizona.

DID YOU RECENTLY REFINANCE?

Here are Five Things You Need to Check!

7ith interest rates at historic lows, homeowners have been refinancing at a record pace in 2020. In fact, so many people have opted to refinance and stay in their existing homes that it has really limited the inventory in our resale market!

Here are a few things you should review if you recently refinanced.

1. DID YOUR PREVIOUS LOAN GET PAID OFF?

When you refinance, you pay off one loan and take on another — often with a different financial institution. Make sure that you received a letter from your initial lender verifying that your loan was satisfied and double check your previous mortgage account online to verify.



2. DID YOU GET THE MONEY BACK YOU **WERE DUE?**

When you refinance, your new lender will require that you re-establish and fund a new impound account for your taxes and insurance. However, often there is still money sitting in your old impound account and, depending on when your next tax bill is due, this amount can be significant. Make sure that you received the balance of the monies you are owed from your previous loan. You should receive a check from your original lender within two to three weeks of your refinance.

3. DID YOUR TAXES GET PAID?

When you refinance and pay off one loan and set up another, any taxes due will need to be paid. We had an incident where a client used an online title company for their refinance, received money back they weren't expecting, and later discovered that their taxes had not been paid. You can check www.mcassessor.maricopa.gov to see if your taxes have been paid by entering your address into the search bar. Once you find your property, click View/Pay Tax Bill.

4. DID YOU TELL YOUR ACCOUNTANT?

Be sure to send the final settlement statement from your refinance to your accountant, especially if you did a cash out refinance or paid points on the refinance. The Tax Cuts and Jobs Act of 2017 altered many of the deductions that were previously available, so it is best to send the statement to your accountant for review.

5. DID YOU PUT YOUR HOME BACK INTO **YOUR TRUST?**

This is a big one! We work regularly with estate attorney Jacqueline Hough at Hough Law Offices, and she recently shared with us that many people are taking their properties out of their trust to refinance.

"As a general rule, most lenders who require the residence to be deeded out of a revocable trust offer to deed the residence back into the trust once the refinancing is complete," Jacqueline advised. "However, we are seeing too many cases with lenders who, for one reason or another, do not actually follow through with the second deed transferring the residence back into the trust, or lenders that do not even offer this as part of the refinance process."

This is an important detail, because if a homeowner passes away, the property that is outside the trust may have to go through the probate process. The probate process is more costly, takes additional time, will slow down the process of selling the property, and can cause added stress on the beneficiaries. You can go to www.recorder.maricopa. gov to check your deed or give us a call and we can look it

If you are thinking of refinancing, just remember to watch your fees (in addition to rates), use a reputable lender and title company, and really evaluate if it makes financial sense to reset your loan. As always, don't hesitate to call us with any questions. ■

ven as COVID-19 kept school campuses closed, the Mesa Public ■Schools construction team worked behind the scenes to ensure schools were ready for a fall return to in-person learning. Thanks to voter approved bond dollars, several schools received much needed improvements this year.

The team focused on projects that support the district's Portrait of a Graduate and its framework to ensure all students graduate ready for college, career and community. Projects included cafeteria and kitchen remodels, carpet installations, roof and sewer line repairs, building safety renovations and parking lot improvements.

CREATING SAFER SCHOOL CAMPUSES

Holly Williams, associate superintendent, reported that front office renovations created secure lobbies and safer campuses. Mesa Academy for Advanced Studies, Kino Junior High School, as well as Lowell, Robson and Taft elementary schools received front office remodels to provide secure access and safety film.

"The office renovations ensure that when school is in session, only individuals who have checked in at the front office are

on campus," Holly shares. "This, in addition to cameras and security film on glass areas, is all a part of making schools safer."

To enhance security procedures, nine sites received ballistic and riot control film, 24 schools installed high-definition security cameras, and five added security fencing.

Allen Moore, director of school safety and security, shares that the cameras and film add a layer of protection for students and staff.

"Along with district safety protocols, the ballistic and riot control film keep students and staff safe in the event someone might try to open fire or break the glass to gain access," Allen said.

FEEDING YOUNG MINDS

Cafeteria construction projects proceeded at Ishikawa Elementary School, and Shepherd and Smith junior high schools updated kitchens for better workflow, making them more inviting for students and staff.

Ishikawa's remodel expanded the cafe's footprint by relocating walls and plumbing, adding new flooring and upgrading the electrical system. A new rolling drop-down door blocks off the area when the kitchen isn't in use, and a new wall mural logo inspires school spirit.

Shepherd transformed its kitchen by installing new flooring, replacing sewer lines, adding windows in the dining area, and upgrading lighting in the cafeteria.

The Latest Alzheimer's **Research Finds Connections**

How the brain changes during early Alzheimer's:

Scientists have been researching the connection between a build-up of amyloid plaques in the brain and the development of Alzheimer's. Now, researchers have uncovered an Alzheimer's gene that could create the conditions for amyloid plaques to show up in the brain.

Neurons that create the conditions for Alzheimer's:

New research has found genetic and molecular connections between amyloid-beta and tau proteins. For the first time, researchers were able to follow the disease's path in neurons that are prone to Alzheimer's.

The research indicates that when aging meets amyloid-beta protein, it can lead to tangles of tau protein which cause the neurons to die. Scientists hope this can help them figure out how to create neurons that are more resistant to this condition.

Frailty increases susceptibility: Researchers believe that people who are physiologically frail are more prone to developing Alzheimer's, while those whose brains are more fit have a better chance of remaining symptom free.

Why light sleepers might have heavier risks: A team of Boston University researchers contend that as we rest, the brain gets rid of proteins that build up while we are awake. This nightly cleansing assists our brain in ways that reduce the chance for developing Alzheimer's.

Among the waste products that get washed away are amyloid-beta proteins. This keeps them from turning into plaque and harming our neurons. Poor sleeping patterns limit our brain's ability to cleanse these proteins.

Can exercise stop Alzheimer's in its tracks? Besides boosting protective brain chemicals, exercise may help the brain retain important connections that often fade as we age. As little as a half hour of physical activity a few times a week can help us become sharper. This applies to both healthy people as well as those already experiencing cognitive impairment.

What about a cure? While a cure remains elusive, there are things we can do that are within our power to help maintain quality of life and promote a healthy brain.

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
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
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
