Poor quality sleep is alarmingly common, with approximately 70 million people suffering from an undiagnosed sleep disorder such as insomnia, sleep apnea or restless leg syndrome.

These sleep disorders can lead to daytime sleepiness, excessive fatigue, snoring, and even more serious conditions like high blood pressure and heart disease.

loud he could bring the paint off the walls,' but don't be embarrassed about that," said Terry. "It's not a matter of snoring as an aesthetic feature, it's a matter of a possible sleep disorder that can cause high blood pressure and heart disease."

Terry's priority is providing a *patients first* experience to diagnose these issues immediately, in a comfortable and quiet office where patients feel at home and welcome.

SleepWerx offers in-office or telemedicine appointments, and scheduling within 48 hours. When patients arrive for their consultation appointment, they'll discuss their symptoms with Terry, they will go over a detailed sleep history and Terry will complete a brief physical exam. They will usually complete an in-home sleep test that same night.

Patients will then follow-up with Terry in the office or through telemedicine to discuss results and treatment plan options. In many cases, patients start to feel better as soon as a week into treatment.

Some people will require a referral, others can self-refer.

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By Cynthia Hayes, NMD hen I was in college in the early 1980s, I would run down the stairs, two at a time. I did it because it was fun, but one day, I missed a step and fell, injuring my ankle. It was badly sprained. I hobbled around on crutches for



several weeks and my ankle healed with time.

Fast forward 30 years — as time had passed, I noticed that there was pain again in my ankle. I hadn't done anything to re-injure it, but I had aged. I found myself hobbling around with pain and stiffness in my right ankle. I would have good and bad days, but it seemed that with time the bad days came more often than the good ones.

I started medical school in 2011 when I was in my 50s. I was fortunate to be assigned to shadow a doctor who did prolotherapy. I watched as he gave this treatment to several patients who were in pain. The patients who were coming back for second or third treatments all said that they had seen improvement in their pain.

So, I tried it. I asked for the prolotherapy injections in my right ankle. Guess what? The pain in my ankle decreased after the first treatment. After the second, I was out of pain. There was no longer any stiffness.

I decided that I had to learn how to do these treatments so that I could help other people regain a better quality of life. I studied under a doctor who is an expert for several years to learn how to administer prolotherapy injections.

Prolotherapy is a treatment that stimulates your body's ability to heal, to strengthen, and repair injured and painful joints, ligaments, and tendons. It can help with musculoskeletal pain.

When ligaments and tendons are stretched and torn, the joint they are holding becomes destabilized and this destabilization can lead to pain. 

Parents have been facing real challenges in juggling their children's education while working to provide for their families.

This was not an easy or even understood job. Technology did not exist for teachers really. Google scrambled to keep up with demand. Teachers had to create their own online curriculum, learn an online education

platform, and then combine the two, hoping that their students would be able to adjust better. This was not an easy task.

A third-grade teacher at Self Development Academy, Jamie Smith, emphasized, "It was so abrupt, and the teachers had to adapt to the online platform quickly. I felt like a student myself having to learn google classroom."

It is important to note that when Mrs. Smith uses the phrase *learn google classroom*, she is not referring to a single program that she, and the rest of the teachers needed to learn. In fact, she is actually referring to many, many different tasks, programs, skills, and communication platforms.

One learns google classroom the same way that one learns the complete physics of the universe. This is to say, learning google classroom is an amalgam of an infinite number of small, difficult, unfamiliar tasks. How do I record and edit video? How do I convert physical material to digital format? How do I get it to students? How do I even know what to do? How do I post grades? How do I create quizzes?

Mrs. Oliver, who has been with SDA for nearly two decades, emotes, "I cried for a full day, thinking that I'd never get google classroom."

Mrs. Smith reflects, "I had a few crying moments as others did. It was a big adjustment for everyone."

Researching for this article reminded me of how lucky Self Development Academy (SDA) has been in teacher retention. At SDA, an advanced K-8 charter school where I work, we do our best to deliver all that our teachers deserve.

A popular teacher at the Phoenix campus, Ms. Lauren White, discloses that, "When I go home every day, I feel as though I hadn't done enough. I feel frustrated with myself because I know how much better they can do and I can do."

One of SDA's master teachers, Mrs. Annmarie Rivera, our Mesa's 4th/5th grade teacher, shares a common refrain, paraphrasing: "Do I have enough to attend to their needs? What if my kids get sick?"

We do not take for granted how fortunate we are to have the teachers we have at our schools. I'll be frank, there are many times, I too, like Phoenix math teacher Ms. White, have been plagued by the question, "What could I have done better?" "How could I help my teachers?"

There are no good solutions. There are only good people.

The year 2020 is about confronting hard, persistent, systematic problems: health care, criminal justice, and disaster preparedness. We have certainly been thoroughly educated in the axiom that *no one's actions are perfectly good*. We all emanate consequences. The world ripples with the composite of our choices and at the end of our life our good can be best seen in the future we have helped build.

That is easy for teachers. Teachers have a unique role. Success is passion interlocked with ability. Ask any school teacher, and they will tell you that their job is really about interlocking passion with ability.

ROCKEFELLER CENTER CHRISTMAS TREE

The Rockefeller Center Christmas Tree has served as a beacon of hope and prosperity for millions each holiday season since its humble beginnings amid the Great Depression.



In December 1931, the United States and the majority of the world were feeling the effects of the Great Depression. While trying to survive and provide in the wake of the 1929 stock market crash — when every penny counted — a group of construction workers in New York City pooled their money together to make a purchase.

It wasn't food. It wasn't clothes. It wasn't fuel. Instead, they bought a Christmas tree to stand on the site of Rockefeller Center, which was just starting to be constructed in Midtown Manhattan. The 20-foot-high (6 meters) balsam fir, adorned with homemade garlands from the workers' families, served as a symbol of hope and optimism during the dire financial and economic times.

Since then, the Rockefeller Center Christmas Tree has been a yearly tradition. The tree was "from the beginning... a gathering place and reflection of what was happening in the world around it."

World War II ushered in simple, patriotic decorations including red, white and blue unlit globes and painted wooden stars. In 1942, instead of one large tree, three more modest trees were raised, each decorated in one of the flag's colors. From 1944 until the war's end in 1945, the tree went unlit due to blackout regulations.

After the war, the year of darkness was left behind, as six ultraviolet light projectors were employed to make it appear as though the tree's 700 fluorescent globes were glowing in the dark. By the 1950s, workers began using scaffolding to decorate the tree, as larger trees were accommodated. Before the decade was over, the decorating process called for 20 workers and nine days.

1951 marked the first time that NBC televised the tree lighting with a special on *The Kate Smith Show*. In 1969, artist Valerie Clarebout's towering wire herald angels were added to the Channel Gardens in front of the tree near Fifth Avenue. Valerie created the 12 sculptures using 75 points of metal wire each.

The 1971 tree, a 65-footer from East Montpelier, Vt., was the first to be mulched and recycled. It was turned into 30 three-bushel bags of mulch for the nature trails of Upper Manhattan.

Though the tree typically makes its journey on a truck bed, in 1998 it was flown in from Richfield, Ohio, on the world's largest transport plane. 1999 saw Rockefeller Center's tallest tree, a 100-foot (30 m) spruce from Killingworth, Conn.

In 2001, following the Sept. 11 attacks, the tree was again decorated in hues of red, white and blue. In 2007, the tree went *green*, converting to energy-efficient lighting with LEDs. The LEDs use 1,200 fewer kilowatts of electricity per day, enough to power a 2000-square-foot home for a month. Also since 2007, each year after display, the tree has been milled into lumber and donated to Habitat for Humanity for use in house construction. ■

Sticky Toffee Pudding Recipe

INGREDIENTS

2 1/2 cups heavy cream 1 stick of butter (4 ounce) 1/2 cup light corn syrup 1 cup granulated sugar 6 ounces pitted dates (about 7 dates preferably Medjool) 3/4 cup water 3/4 cup plus 2 tablespoons all-purpose flour 1 teaspoon baking powder 1/2 teaspoon baking soda 1 pinch of salt 4 tablespoons unsalted butter (softened) 3/4 cup packed light brown sugar 1 large egg 1/2 teaspoon pure vanilla extract Vanilla ice cream or lightly sweetened whipped cream (for serving)

Step 1

In a medium saucepan, combine 1 1/4 cups of the cream with the butter, corn syrup and sugar; bring to a boil. Cook over moderately low heat, stirring frequently, until a deep amber caramel forms, about 40 minutes. Carefully whisk in the remaining 1 1/4 cups of cream. Strain the sauce through a sieve into a bowl.

Step 2

In a small saucepan, simmer the dates in the water over moderately low heat until the water is nearly absorbed and the dates are soft, about 15 minutes. Transfer the dates and any liquid to a food processor and puree until very smooth.

Step 3

Preheat the oven to 350 degrees. Lightly butter six 1/2-cup ramekins. In a small bowl, whisk the flour with the baking powder, baking soda and salt. In a medium bowl, using an electric mixer, beat the butter with the brown sugar at medium speed until light and fluffy. Beat in the egg and vanilla, then beat in the date puree. At low speed, beat in the dry ingredients. Spoon the batter into the ramekins and smooth the tops. Bake for 20 minutes, or until a toothpick inserted into the centers comes out



clean; let cool slightly.

Step 4

Using a small serrated knife, trim the tops of the cakes level with the rims of the ramekins. Unmold the cakes and invert them onto a wire rack. Slice each cake in half horizontally. Wipe out the ramekins and spoon 1 tablespoon of the toffee sauce into each. Return the bottom layers of the cakes to the ramekins, cut side up. Spoon another tablespoon of the toffee sauce into the ramekins and top with the remaining cake layers. Spoon another tablespoon of the toffee sauce over the cakes and spread evenly. Place the ramekins on a baking sheet and bake for 10 minutes, or until the toffee is bubbling around the edges.

Step 5

Let the puddings cool for 5 minutes, then run a thin-bladed knife around the insides of the ramekins; invert each pudding onto a dessert plate. Rewarm the remaining toffee sauce and spoon some around the puddings. Serve with vanilla ice cream or whipped cream.

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

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

HOW SHOULD I SAVE for a Child's Education? consider an education savings 529 Account

Most parents and grandparents want their progeny to receive the benefits of a good education so that children can learn the skills which will allow them to become productive members of society as adults. However, to afford the potential cost of a college education, it's important to start saving early in a child's life.

The most efficient type of account to save for future education related expenses is hands down a tax-advantaged 529 college savings account. Almost every state sponsors their own 529 plan, but you don't need to use your state's plan, and it pays to shop. We recommend that our clients use the Utah 529 plan (my529.org) because of low fees and excellent investment options. You do not need to pay an advisor to manage money in a 529 account.

An Arizona couple filing jointly can receive up to \$4,000 in annual AZ tax credits for funding a 529 account. Money invested in a 529 grows tax free and comes out tax free as long as the money is used for any educational related expense (i.e., tuition, room and board, a computer, supplies, transportation, etc.).

529 accounts can also be an important estate planning tool. Under the current gift tax exemption, a married couple can fund a 529 account up to \$30,000 per child each year. A special provision also allows you to pre-fund up to 5 years' worth of your exemption (\$150,000) in one lump sum.

Consider funding a 529 for a newborn and inviting parents and grandparents to make an investment in that child's future.

TAKEOUT TUESDAY OR ANY DAY at Sam & Luca Rustic Kitchen

d akeout has become a popular alternative for eating out these days, and although safely spaced indoor and patio dining are popular at Sam & Luca Rustic Kitchen, their takeout business is booming.

And no wonder — the food is spectacular and every Tuesday all takeout menu items are discounted 20 percent. Curbside pickup is also available.

We decided to try the celebrated *Takeout Tuesday*, and having not yet experienced the restaurant, we were glad we did.

When we arrived around 4 p.m., there was already brisk takeout activity going on. It was really hard to choose from all the tempting offerings like Chicken Marsala, Shrimp Scampi, as well as a variety of pasta dishes, so we decided on four popular entrees and two desserts. We just had to have that Tiramisu!

Arriving home, the entrees were still perfect dining temperature, so we dug in. First tried was the Grilled Shrimp Risotto. Perfectly grilled butterflied shrimp with a light garlic butter sauce sat atop creamy risotto mixed with corn, sautéed bits of Roma tomatoes and artichoke, and





topped with a variety of fresh snipped herbs and lemon zest. It was delicious.

Next, we went for the Spinach Ravioli. Tender, good-sized pasta puffs generously filled with cheeses and chopped spinach floated in a yummy white cream sauce.

Eggplant Parmesan is always my favorite go-to at Italian-style restaurants and I can honestly say Sam & Luca's version is the best I've ever tasted. Melt in your mouth layers of eggplant and mozzarella and parmesan cheeses were surrounded by the most delicious hand-breaded crust of bread crumbs, herbs and parmesan. An amazingly flavorful marinara sauce laced with garlic and olive oil was more than enough to share with the side of capellini.

Sam & Luca's Chef Rosalio Tarin has more than 30 years' experience in Italian cuisine, creating at Tomaso's in Phoenix and Tommy V's in Scottsdale. He prides himself on every entrée being made from scratch. He is also known in the business for his Bolognese Sauce and rightly so.

To try it out, we ordered the Lasagna. It was a lot like my Italian Nana used to make with tender layers of pasta

topped with ricotta and mozzarella and maybe a pinch of nutmeg. Covering the entire dish was the famed Bolognese. The hearty tomato sauce loaded with ground beef, pork and veal, sautéed with minced garlic, carrot and onion, is so hearty and tasty you could almost eat it as a meal itself.

We had to wait awhile after all that before tackling the desserts, but they were both worth the wait. The Salted Caramel Cheesecake was a velvety mouthful of creamy cheesecake and graham cracker crust all smothered in a not-too-sweet salted caramel sauce.

And the Tiramisu? As good as any I've had. The rum and coffee-soaked cake was soft and moist, layered with creamy mascarpone custard and whipped cream and plated with a chocolate drizzle. A fantastic finale to a great dinner.

If you are looking for a great-tasting family takeout meal, Sam & Luca also has several combo dinners that can serve four to six. A choice of Pasta and Meatballs, Lasagna, or Chicken Parmesan all come with Caesar Salad and Fresh-Baked Bread.

Sam & Luca is small and quaint, with an open kitchen. Diners can watch their meal being prepared while sampling some of the four red and four white wines available on tap, and eight craft beers on draft. A large selection of wine is also available by the bottle. Their mixology includes a Limoncello Martini and an Italian Margherita with Amaretto. Enjoy Happy Hour specials from 3 to 6 p.m.

Lunch and dinner are served inside or on the patio. Owner Sam Arikat invites you to come out and enjoy their establishment. "We also do catering," he said.

cannot tell you how many calls I have received this month from people who have seen the endless Medicare commer-

cials on TV and want to know what they are missing, or what do they mean by, "Some Medicare Advantage plans may even help pay your Part B premium."

While not illegal, these commercials are very misleading.

A very small percentage of the Medicare beneficiaries qualify for this benefit. It is based completely on income and is subsidized by our state Medicaid programs - AHCCCS. The commer-

I met with a lady the other day who called the number, was switched to a plan she had never heard of and one that her doctor did not accept. Thankfully, we are still in open enrollment and I was able to get her on a plan that worked better for her needs.

Please don't call the number on the television, but instead call a local, licensed agent that can sit with you, ask you questions and help you pick a plan that fits your needs and lifestyle.

As a Medicare health plan agent, I am paid by the insurance companies, so you don't pay any out-of-pocket fees for my help. I won't pressure you, just simply provide information, present options, and let you choose what is best for your situation.

Someone asked me which plan is best. Quite honestly, it depends on what is best for each individual.
