In fact, hand them a dirt road to four-wheel on, a mountain to climb, or a board game to play and its game on for Jaxen and Kai Pastores.

However, competition quickly fades into mutual respect and admiration when the two take their talents onto the greens. The boys, described as two peas in a pod by their father Jan, have moved to an outdoor paradise they love and respect. This admiration seems to be reflective in the warm welcome they have received from the Mesa community.

Jaxen and Kai relocated to the East Valley from Alabama, with their dad, in the summer of 2019, just before golf team tryouts at Red Mountain High School — Jaxen's senior and Kai's junior year in high school. When the energetic duo arrived in Arizona on the Fourth of July, they were able to meet high school golf coach, Frank Campos, who in turn introduced the boys to a new golf family, leading to many new friendships.

"Red Mountain High School welcomed the boys with open arms," remembers their dad. Coach Campos was eager to meet the hopefuls, knowing that their Alabama golf resumes were strong. He was also very aware of the differences in Alabama golf versus Arizona golf. The boys would be adapting from cold, spring seasonal play to fall play here in Arizona.

"The course lengths here in Arizona are a little longer and the weather is, well, much warmer," Coach Campos informed them. Soon after tryouts though came the realization that these solid players had earned top spots on the team.

And what an impression the boys made their first year in Arizona. Besides leading the Lions into the State playoffs, the older of the duo, Jaxen, earned the title of East Valley Region Player of the Year. Both Jaxen and Kai were named to the All East Valley Region Team. Additionally, Jaxen won the Mesa City Championship in 2019 with Kai placing runner up to his older brother.

And, the Red Mountain Lions have recently ended their fall golf season for 2020. Once again Kai participated in the State competition, winning the East Valley Region Championship. Upcoming decisions might be, will Kai follow in his brother's footsteps, staying close to home, or will he blaze his own path? The options have been promising for both athletes.

#### WHY GOLF?

As children the boys played multiple sports in Alabama, including baseball, football and basketball, which often included travel team play, constantly keeping them on-thego. But the demands of high school sports compelled the competitors to focus their choice in athletics. During their sophomore and freshman year, Jaxen and Kai, respectively, chose golf over football. Varsity level golfing was something they had each experienced since the seventh grade.

Jaxen claims that his golf game emerged quickly from playing on weekends with his dad to competitive tournament play as a seventh grader. His natural skills helped him choose golf as his sport of focus as his school years progressed. "Besides," he admitted, "the football and basketball athletes got much taller and bigger than me physically in high school."

But it's not just the golf course that holds the attention of Jaxen, Kai and their biggest fan, their father Jan. The boys are also distance runners. Together, with their dad, they workout, attend hot yoga classes (their dad's favorite), hike, bike, and when they are not practicing their swing at the Longbow golf course's driving range or getting in a weekend round, you might find them fourwheeling the dirt roads of Bulldog Canyon in the Tonto National Forest or climbing to the top of Camelback

## Great Sleep Helps Start THE NEW YEAR WITH SUCCESS

Tith 2021 kicking off and people evaluating their goals for the new year, many might be overlooking the importance of quality sleep in reaching any goal.

Lack of sleep can lead to forgetfulness, irritability, and even workplace accidents or dangerous, drowsy driving.

"Sleep actually heightens brain function itself so a lack of sleep for whatever reason really impacts your cognitive performance," said SleepWerx founder Terry L. Penner. "It affects your thinking, your decision making. Sleep also enhances mood."

Terry, who is a double board-certified nurse practitioner with more than four decades of experience in the medical industry, sees how lack of sleep can make it harder for people to reach their goals in all aspects of life.

Health-related New Year's resolutions are the most



common goals, but lack of sleep can derail a healthy diet by pushing people to eat more convenient, less nutritious foods and lean too heavily on sugar and caffeine stimulants.

"People tend to use way too much caffeine when they're not sleeping," said Terry. "They also consume too much sweet soda. People tend to overdo it on sugar and junk because it's easy to grab when they just don't have the energy to cook a good meal or prepare a big salad."


This year, Terry has seen an increase in patients seeking help with insomnia as well as more patients experiencing anxiety around contracting COVID-19 or being home more often. This makes it more difficult for them to enjoy restful sleep, especially if they aren't practicing a relaxing night routine.


"A lot of people don't wind down before bed," said Terry. "A lot of people wait until the last second and think 'Oh, it's 11! I've got to go to sleep,' but your brain is

To create a better sleep routine Terry recommends winding down two hours before bed, and reserving the bedroom for sleep and intimacy only. Going to bed at the same time each night and getting up at the same time no matter what are important strategies for good sleep. Setting the clock for 30 minutes later rather than repeating 5 minutes of interrupted sleeps can help reduce morning grogginess.

"With electronics, even a game or reading an eBook, can make people's heart rate go up," said Terry. "Do things that are non-engaging for relaxation. Whether it's sitting in low light or having a warm bath. There are also programs on YouTube on yoga for sleep. Even ten to 20 minutes of gentle stretching and deep breathing can be great for winding down." ■

# Brilliant Planet Creates a Wonderland of Opportunities

n the corner of Hermosa Vista Drive and 78th Street in Mesa, there is a local non-profit called Brilliant Planet that is in need of volunteers to help make an impact on the Arizona food system.

The founder and executive director of the non-profit is Terra Rose Ganem. She believes that volunteers should come to the property — which they call Wonderland — to "learn about nutrition, different ways to grow food, and connect with like-minded people."

Volunteers can do a variety of activities, from planting trees, attending workshops, making crafts, teaching classes, helping set up for events, and many other opportunities. One of the volunteers, Ashley Weston, states, "I met several people and had such a good time getting to connect."

A member of the Girl Garden Society, Sarah King, said, "I now have my own tower garden. It's something I do with my kids and a good way to introduce different foods to them."

Terra Rose, a 33-year-old certified nutritionist, knew what she was going to do from a very young age. "When I was three years old, my mom gave me a sunflower seed, one day it grew taller than me and that is when I realized the magic and potential just one little seed held," she explained.

Terra Rose founded Brilliant Planet in March 2019 with the core message of teaching people that growing your own organic food can be easy and fun no matter how much space, time, or resources you have. She chose to start this organization as a non-profit so it is accessible to a wide range of people from all demographic backgrounds.

Aude Monson, an expatriate from France, said, "I have met a lot of people from various ages and backgrounds. I was also able to create a community of like-minded people. To me, it means the world."

Brilliant Planet also supports children in foster care, those with special needs, and families that experience food insecurity. Further accessibility is made possible by a fellowship Arizona State University is offering in

partnership with the Piper Trust Charitable Organization. The fellowship provides an opportunity for college-level research on the truth of Arizona's food system and the challenges of eating healthy.

If you cannot volunteer, the non-profit also takes donations, which are used for planting orchards, buying nutrients for the soil, building infrastructure to support education, and buying materials for classes.

Ashley Weston, one of the volunteers, "donates every single month to Brilliant Planet," said Terra Rose. Ashley's donations are used for purchasing seeds for kids to grow. "Brilliant Planet is dedicated to reuniting people with themselves, each other, and nature to create more joy, peace, and connection in their lives," said Terra Rose.

Poached Salmon Served with Cucumber-Dill Yogurt Salad Start by poaching salmon in seasoned cooking broth.

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
2 carrots 1 large onion 1 cup white wine (if any is left over from New 2 whole lemons 1 gallon of water

Simmer liquid for 25 minutes, turn off heat and add salmon (7-oz) to liquid and poach for 7 minutes. Remove salmon and set to cool.

2 cucumbers - peel and slice, removing seeds 1 small red onion - peel and slice thin 1 cup plain yogurt 1 tbsp chopped fresh dill 1 red bell pepper sliced julienne 1 diced shallot

Seniors can also reach out for connection. Goodnight Zoom and Lunchtime Laughter, activities that are both offered through the Zoom platform, provide free daily activities for seniors to stay engaged and socially connected. Goodnight Zoom pairs an isolated senior with a child for story time.

Lunchtime Laughter is geared toward Alzheimer's patients, family members, and caregivers. It offers a noon comedy session to help participants cope with social isolation during social distancing.

Beginning with the kindergarten year, students are academically challenged, and high expectations are established within a nurturing environment. SDA elementary school students obtain a solid foundation in language arts, mathematics, science, and social studies. Students are taught at the mastery level, and the curriculum emphasizes higher level thinking skills such as critical thinking and problem solving.

By the time SDA students reach middle school many are prepared to enroll in advanced coursework within the core subjects. During middle school, students have the opportunity to complete Pre-Algebra, Algebra I and II, Geometry, advanced literature, and science coursework including Biology, Chemistry, and Physics. Many of these courses are not offered until high school.

Students completing eighth grade at SDA are enrolled in Honors and Advanced Placement courses upon entering high school. Additionally, many students receive high



school credit for courses completed at SDA. This enhances their grade point averages and makes them highly competitive students when applying to colleges and universities.

The goal of SDA administration and teachers is for SDA students to enter high school with a foundation in the core subjects and more importantly, a love for learning that lasts a lifetime. What can we expect from 2021? See our predictions below.

#### **SUPER LOW INVENTORY**

As we were writing this in mid-December, there were only 3,864 single family homes on the market in Maricopa County, a county of 4.5 million residents. We have 50 percent fewer homes on the market than in 2020 and inventory continues to drop.

Consequently, the average sales price is up 17 percent over last year. Many people have refinanced and are staying in place and there are simply not enough new homes coming to market to absorb our increasing demand. Our housing inventory would have to more than quadruple to get us to a balanced market.

So, for 2021 expect to continue to see bidding wars, rising prices, and lotteries for new builds.

#### **PRICES WILL CONTINUE TO RISE**

Prices will continue their ascent simply due to lack of inventory. According to Realtor.com's 2021 Housing Forecast, Valley home prices are expected to jump 7 percent or more next year.

Not only is there a large influx of buyers coming from other states, there are a lot of leftover buyers from this year who are still waiting in the wings to find the right home. Of course, this means it is a great time to sell, as long as you have a plan for where to move next!

#### **INTEREST RATES AND AFFORDABILITY**

While historically low interest rates have made homeownership a possibility for many more buyers, finding a home within budget will remain a struggle in 2021. Buyers will continue to have to be aggressive and have a strong strategy for success. Often this requires having extra cash on hand to bid over asking price.

If you have kids who are trying to purchase their first home, consider a gift to help them bridge the gap. Rental rates are rising just as fast as housing values (Phoenix had the highest rent increases in the country), and affordability issues will increasingly be barriers for renters and homebuyers alike.

We predict that interest rates will stay low for at least the first part of 2021, but may rise a bit by the end of the year. Waiting is not going to benefit potential buyers this year.

#### A SOCIOLOGICAL SHIFT

Across the globe, housing has been bolstered by the changes in the way we work, go to school, play, and live. With an abundance of people working from home, many people have fled the cities for bigger footprints in less populated areas and even different states.

People are upsizing, seeking larger lots, looking for outdoor amenities, and extra rooms. In 2021 we anticipate that this trend will continue to fuel housing demand and result in a continued increased in spending on home improvement — P.S. The Tiny House movement is officially dead.

#### IS REAL ESTATE HEADED TOWARD A CRASH?

NAR Chief Economist Dr. Lawrence Yun answers this question best:

"Such a frenzy of activity, reminiscent of 2006, raises questions about a bubble and the potential for a painful crash. The answer: THERE IS NO COMPARISON."

"Back in 2006, dubious adjustable-rate mortgages taxed many buyers' budgets. Some loans didn't even require income documentation. Today, buyers are taking out 30-year fixed-rate mortgages. Fourteen years ago, there were 3.8 million homes listed for sale, and home builders were putting up about 2 million new units. Now, inventory is only about 1.5 million homes, and home builders are under-producing relative to historical averages."

#### **STRONG LOCAL GROWTH**

We are lucky because the Phoenix Metro area is well positioned for sustained economic growth. Recently, the National Association of Realtors, along with 20 economists, forecasted the top markets for economic strength based on domestic migration, low unemployment, mobility, and other factors, and Phoenix came in at the top of the list.

Phoenix is the No. 1 market in the country for job growth and we are seeing significant industrial growth and manufacturing expansion in the region, which will help to insulate the Valley from national economic challenges.

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

## Be Aware of Coronavirus STIMULUS SCAMS

**T** i everyone. Hope this information finds you and yours in good health. I have discussed these issues in a previous article, but



it is worth revisiting. Unscrupulous people, more than ever, are taking advantage of others in this difficult time.

The coronavirus has created a new group of scammers. They want to steal your money, personal information, and often both. Government agencies, including the FBI, are alerting us that phone calls, texts or emails asking for personally identifiable information to be eligible for federal payments are **not legitimate**.

Many of the scams being used are re-works of classic financial scams. They use the pandemic and stimulus payments as a hook.

Most of these scams use one of these

- · Fake checks sent in the mail
- Phishing schemes sent out over text messages, email, and social media
- Phone calls by impersonators pretending to be a government official

The fake check scammers create fake stimulus checks for more money than was expected. The victim is then notified that they were overpaid and need to send the overpayment back through various means. Later, the fake check bounces and the victim is out the money they sent to the scammer.

The phishing scammers attempt

to trick the victim by pretending to be someone who is known and trusted. They send out emails aimed at collecting the victims personal and/or financial information, and then use the information to drain the victims bank account, open credit cards, or other similar identity frauds.

Here are some tips to keep your stimulus check out of the hands of these scammers:

- The IRS will not call or text you about your stimulus payment.
- + If you have filed taxes for 2018 and/or 2019, you don't need to do anything to claim your stimulus payment.
- The official term for this payment is economic impact payment. If someone is using terms like coronavirus check or stimulus payment, there is a good chance they are scammers.
- It is not likely you will be overpaid by

### Las Sendas Elementary Teacher Makes **REMOTE LEARNING COME ALIVE**

**7** ven though students in Melissa ≺ Smith's fifth-grade remote class → at Las Sendas Elementary School aren't in the same physical classroom, they start their day like all students — bonding with their classmates.

Students begin at 8 a.m., and spend the first 15 minutes of the morning engaging with each other. They discuss their drawings, artwork and interesting artifacts. One student even shared his crystal collection.

Live class sessions end between 10:30 and 10:45 a.m. and then Melissa connects individually with her 30 students. She shares that the minute students sign on, she greets them with The Name Game Song, because students love hearing their name and it sets a positive tone for their virtual space.

#### **NAVIGATING THE VIRTUAL CLASSROOM**

Melissa has been teaching for 18 years and says remote instruction is very different from being in the classroom. Her students spend a great deal of time on the screen, and she is always looking for creative ways to provide non-screen learning opportunities.



Melissa shares that students learning via remote can feel isolated and sad. To ease some of the stress and tension in her students. she created some interesting learning opportunities, using

science and STEM.

"When I decided to teach remotely, I knew that I wanted to be good at it so that I could provide students with great learning experiences," Melissa said.



"I have to be flexible and willing to change things up so I can meet them where they are. I wanted to make learning fun and to do something a little bit different that is offscreen and hands on."

During a brainstorming session, Melissa got the idea to put science and STEM kits together to engage her students. Parents donated Amazon gift cards to fund the project. Her goal was to have the kits ready for her students' return from holiday break.

Melissa created nine science lessons and nine STEM activities. Each kit contains everything students need to participate in the activities, right down to real magnifying glasses, science notebooks, owl pellets and certified scientist laboratory lanyards.

"Every week, my students have a well-planned science experiment and a creative STEM activity that are not only fun, but provide an outlet for practicing the engineering process." ■



## **Are You Still Planning to Retire Early?**
