The projects will include using math and science to devise methods to move large stones, how to erect large buildings, and ship building — to name just a few of the possible projects the students will participate in.

Students will also participate in a reenactment of the ancient civilizations utilizing the art they create throughout the summer. The students will set up a bartering system where they trade as the

ancient people did along the trade route. This will allow them to use what they learn about the ancient civilizations in a fun, interactive way.

The Mesa summer program will be facilitated by Self Development Preschool (SDP). The program for the Mesa campus will run Monday to Friday beginning May 24 and run through July 31. The Mesa program will also include Fun Fridays with different weekly themes and activities. ■

# LET'S TALK ABOUT FATIGUE

**7**ith so many changes in the last year, fatigue is getting blamed on stress and lifestyle changes due to the pandemic. Of course, this is a very valid reason for fatigue. But why are we fatigued? What is happening



physiologically to our bodies? And is it all about stress or is the nature of aging adding to our fatigue?

When we are feeling stressed, our body produces a

Cortisol is made by our adrenal glands. Adrenal glands

hormone called cortisol. Cortisol gets a bad rap for this known effect but what else does cortisol do?

are small fatty like caps located on top of our kidneys. Most of our cells in our body have receptors for cortisol. Cortisol helps regulate our metabolism, sugar levels, reduce inflammation and control blood pressure by regulating the salt/water system in our cells. It is also essential for fetal development. So, cortisol is a very important hormone for

our bodily functions and our feeling of wellbeing.

# **CORTISOL PATTERNS OF DISRUPTION**

Cortisol rises in the morning hours and is what helps us wake up. As the day progresses it lowers and should be at its lowest at bedtime so we can fall asleep. When the adrenals are stressed, cortisol can be too low in the morning and we feel sluggish reaching for caffeine to wake up. Then as we stress more during the day, cortisol rises too high, and now it is too high, and interferes with the ability to fall asleep. After this stressful pattern, the adrenals can become truly exhausted (especially from excess caffeine intake) and now true adrenal fatigue causes exhaustion.

When our cortisol rises due to stress or steroid use (like prednisone or even topical corticosteroid creams) use, we gain weight, can become depressed, our sex hormones get depleted, and some people develop Cushing syndrome or some people can develop Cushing disease from a tumor on the adrenal gland. Too much cortisol can also lead to osteoporosis (another side effect from taking steroids long term).

When our adrenals are taxed from long term stress they shrink, and we become tired. Adrenal fatigue is a true urgent medical condition that can easily be treated once properly diagnosed.



## **DEPLETED HORMONES**


But let's talk about fatigue due to depleted hormones. A lot of people in their forties and fifties (I have some younger patients, also) have depleted thyroid and sex hormones. When estrogen and testosterone become deficient, fatigue can set in. Now not only do we feel tired all the time, we start gaining weight, feel grumpy, lose interest in sex, and just plain feel terrible. When thyroid hormones are depleted, we can lose our hair, feel cold all the time, gain weight, and have difficulty exercising.

With all these different reasons for feeling fatigued we start to blame ourselves for lack of motivation or I must be a lazy person. This negative chatter sets off self-hate and depression that then leads to more fatigue. What if it's not YOU but your hormones?

Why not come by for a hormone assessment to see if your fatigue is truly from lifestyle changes due to the pandemic or due to a physiological reason that has slowly created a nagging fatigue that can't be remedied by caffeine or even rest. Let's stop the negative self-chatter and see if your hormones are too high (cortisol) or too low (hypothyroid or low sex hormones). What would your life be like if you weren't' so tired? ■



By Scott Johnson, ĆFP®, AIF®, CPFA t's not a secret that Americans aren't saving enough for retirement. The National Institute on Retirement Security (NIRS) says that 75 percent of Americans



are not on track to meet their retirement goals and 21 percent are not saving at all.

Most financial planning experts, backed by many studies, agree that the average American needs to save at least 15 percent of their pre-tax salary for retirement. However, the 15 percent rule of thumb takes a couple of factors for granted — namely that you begin saving pretty early in life. To retire comfortably by following the 15 percent rule, you'd need to get started at age 25 if you wanted to retire by 62, or at age 35 if you wanted to retire by 65.

It also assumes that you need an annual income in retirement equivalent to 55 to 80 percent of your pre-retirement income to live comfortably. Depending on your spending habits, outstanding debts, and medical expenses, more or less may be necessary but 55 to 80 percent is a good estimate for most people.



When it comes to saving for retirement, time is your greatest ally. The money you save into an IRA or 401(k) in your 20's is exponentially more valuable to you than the same dollars you will contribute in your 30's, 40's, and 50's because of the time value of money.

If you are late to the retirement savings game, then you may need to save more than 15 percent of your annual income to reach your retirement goal. Conversely, if you have teenage or young adult children, have them open their Roth IRA accounts now and get them to fund as much of their W-2 earnings as possible up to the \$6000 annual maximum. They may not understand the importance of it today, but they will be grateful they did in the future! ■

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


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# Selling Your Home in a Weekend is Possible

ellers used to hate the thought of listing their home, knowing it would take weeks or months to sell, having to keep it show ready, and packing up the kids and pets at a moment's notice for a showing, but those days are gone.



With our record low inventory, prices continuing to increase month over month, and so few homes for buyers to choose from, homes are flying off the shelves. If a home isn't sold within the first couple of days of being on the market, we wonder why.

Of course, each home is different and there are still overpriced or are hard homes to sell, but for those homes at the low to mid-price points, we are seeing multiple offers and bidding wars as soon as they hit the market. Even high-end homes are selling at not only record prices but in record time.

There are different strategies in this type of market to achieve not just the highest price but the highest and best offer. Sellers have to be careful not to over price their home in this market which is very tempting to do when prices keep going up. The last thing you want to do is overprice your home and then have it sitting on the market.

The funny thing is, we used to question about a home sitting on the market after a couple of months, now it's a couple of weeks or even days. If a home doesn't sell right away and has been on the market for a week or two, we wonder what's wrong with it.

Last month, I had a buyer who was working with another agent call me directly. They had put in ten offers, all above the list price, and kept getting rejected. They were getting so frustrated, and with two young children, were worried they would never be able to buy a home in

They called me with two homes they would like to look at and they fell in love with the first one they saw. It was a Tuesday, and the home was listed the Saturday before but had no offers. It was a great house, and perfect for my buyers, so we were shocked they had no offers.

Because it had already been on the market for three days — I know that sounds crazy to think three days is a long time with no offers — I was able to negotiate on the price and we got it for \$10,000 under the list price. My buyers were so happy after putting in so many offers above asking to be getting the first one we looked at and under

Pricing the home where it needs to be and marketing it to sell right away is key in today's market. The seller has much more negotiating room when there are multiple offers verses just one offer and if it sits on the market, buyers are more likely to offer under list price.

## WHEN TO LIST YOUR HOME

With homes selling so quickly, you need to make sure you are ready to move in 30 days, which is the typical time frame to close. For my clients, when they are ready to list their home, we choose a weekend when they can be out of town or gone all day. That way we can have an open house and back-to-back showings all weekend without disturbing them. All offers received over the weekend are presented on Monday and it is all done in one weekend.

Even with homes selling so quickly, you still want to do everything you can to sell for top price. While you may not need to do repairs and upgrades in this seller's market, taking the time to stage your home and having it show ready will give the buyers the best first impression.

While it's great for sellers that homes are selling so quickly, it does come with its own set of challenges. With multiple offers and buyers getting creative with what they offer, it has never been more important to analyze all the offers to ensure you are accepting not just the highest but the best offer. Multiple offers also give the seller a lot more room for negotiations to make the offer even better and more advantageous for them.

Another change we are seeing more of in this market

is buyers cancelling within the first ten days and homes coming back on the market. Part of the reason for this is buyers are jumping in with both feet and throwing everything into their offer to get it accepted. Then when they do finally get an offer accepted, they have buyer's remorse. Maybe it's not quite the right house for them after all or they offered more than they are really comfortable with.

With the added negotiations and analyzing of multiple offers to make sure you accept the right one, having an experienced Realtor to guide you through this process is so important.

## **HOW MUCH IS MY HOME WORTH?**

When you are thinking about selling your home the first thing you want to know is how much your home is worth. Chances are you will jump on internet sites such as Realtor.com or Zillow.com but these sites use their own algorithms and can give you very different estimates. I just looked up a new listing and Realtor.com was \$43,000 higher than Zillow.com

Not only are the values so different on these sights but they are usually way off from where the home value really is. It used to be they were over valuing homes, however in today's market I am seeing more homes undervalued so don't give too much credit to the value on these sites.

If you do want to go online to get a quick value, you can get an accurate home estimate at InstantHomeValueAZ.com, which takes you to my website, and I will personally run the report for you. However, the only way to get the true market value of your home is to schedule an appointment for a free home valuation.

- Sun block, tennis shoes, cap or visor should be worn. A minimum 30 SPF is recommended.
- Ice chest/coolers: Fill with ice, sport drinks, fruit juice and water. One to two bottles of water per hour while floating is recommended to help prevent dehydration. ■

## **GOLDMAN SACHS' RESEARCH NOTE ON HOUSING**

"Strong demand for housing looks sustainable. Even before the pandemic, demographic tailwinds and historicallylow mortgage rates had pushed demand to high levels... consumer surveys indicate that household buying intentions are now the highest in 20 years... As a result, the model projects double-digit price gains both this year and next."

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

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# Can You Identify the Signs of Stroke FAST?

stroke is a serious medical emergency, and the odds of survival are much higher if help comes quickly. If you know the signs of a stroke, you might save someone's life.

In fact, stroke is the 5th leading cause of death in the US. Every year more than 795,000 people in the United States have a stroke, about 610,000 of them for the first time. Stroke kills almost 130,000 Americans each year. According to the CDC, one American dies from stroke every 4 minutes.

## WHAT ARE THE TYPES OF STROKE?

There are several types of stroke. They all involve disrupted blood flow in the brain that leads to brain damage. Here are the most common types.

- *Ischemic Stroke:* This stroke occurs when a clot blocks blood supply to the brain, causing brain cells to lose oxygen. If not treated immediately, this lack of oxygen can cause brain cells to die.
- Transient Ischemic Attacks (TIA): This is a type of ischemic stroke, but TIA involves only a temporary blood clot that goes away on its own. A TIA is a warning that a bigger, more serious stroke may be on the way.
- Hemorrhagic stroke: This involves bleeding in the brain rather than a clot. Hemorrhagic stroke causes include aneurysms and arteriovenous malformations. These are weak blood vessels. Uncontrolled high blood pressure is the most common cause of hemorrhagic stroke.
- Silent stroke: This type of stroke has no noticed symptoms and is rarely identified until long after it occurs. The damage they cause is subtle. Over time, the impacts of silent stroke may begin to emerge.

## WHAT ARE THE SIGNS OF A STROKE?

The National Stroke Association has created the acronym FAST. This acronym tells you what to do if you suspect someone is having a stroke. First, you will assess the



person for the most common signs of a stroke. If they're showing symptoms, you will immediately call for help. Remembering FAST will ensure that you can respond to the warning signs of a stroke.

FAST signs of a stroke include:

- Face drooping: One side of the face may droop or become numb. Ask the person to smile. Does one side of the face droop?
- Arm weakness: One arm may become weak or numb. Ask the person to raise both arms. Does one arm drift
- Speech: Speech may become slurred and difficult to understand. Ask the person to repeat a simple phrase. Is speech slurred or garbled?
- Time to call: If you observe any of these signs, call 9-1-1 immediately. Call even if the signs go away. Check the time so you know exactly when symptoms

Acting quickly in the event of a stroke is essential. The chances of survival are greater when emergency treatment begins quickly. Patients who receive treatment within three hours of symptoms starting have better outcomes than those who don't.

If someone is having a stroke, call an ambulance, don't try to drive them to the hospital yourself. First responders can begin life-saving treatment and perform CPR on the way to the emergency room. They can help ensure that

diagnosis and treatment begin immediately upon hospital arrival. Since quick action is so crucial for stroke outcomes, it's critical to call 911 for an ambulance.

## **RECOVERING FROM A STROKE**


Recovering from a stroke can be challenging. Patients must simultaneously overcome physical, cognitive, and emotional challenges. Many stroke survivors report frustrations with the recovery process. Having a professional care team can help you take a proactive and informed approach to poststroke care for your loved one to ease stress.

If you have a loved one recovering from a stroke, there are ways to help. You can promote recovery by assisting them to regain a sense of normalcy. This support will help your loved one practice the skills needed for a full recovery. After someone has suffered a stroke, they may experience short or long-term disabilities. The months following a stroke are crucial for long-term recovery.

If possible, your loved one should return home when they are ready to discharge from the hospital. In-home care can allow your loved one to live in the comfort of their home — with new limitations.

Professional care providers can help with daily tasks, such as mobility support, help with dressing and hygiene, cooking and light housekeeping, preparing healthy meals that lower cholesterol and keep blood sugar under control, assisting with exercise to improve blood pressure, and scheduling and attending medical appointments to manage medical conditions.
