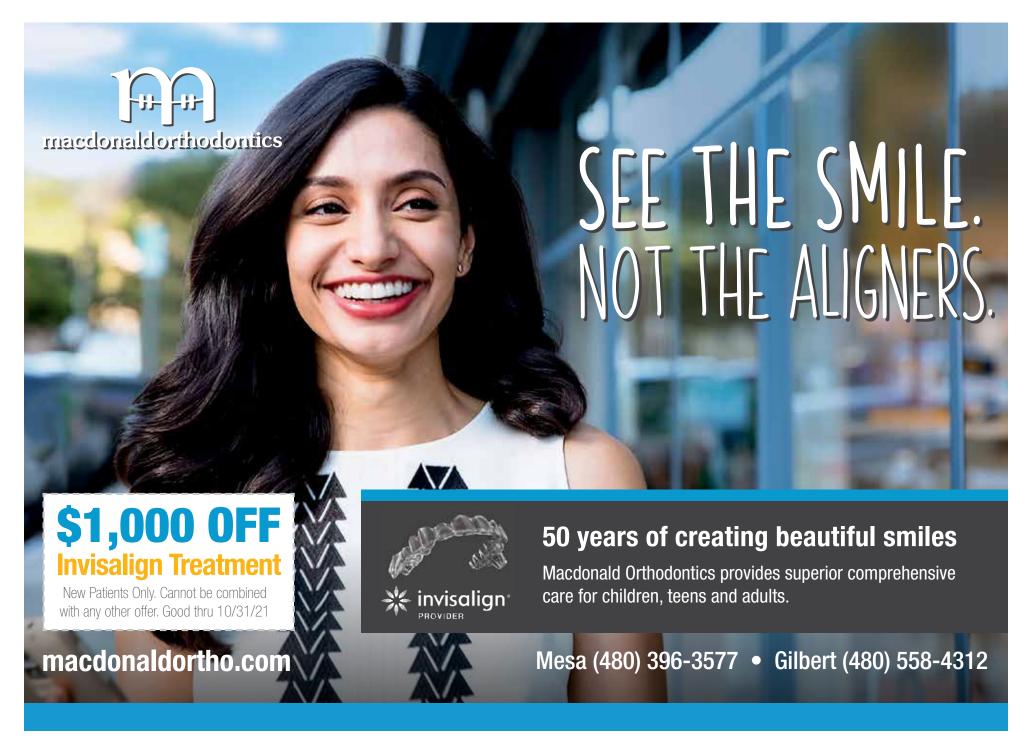

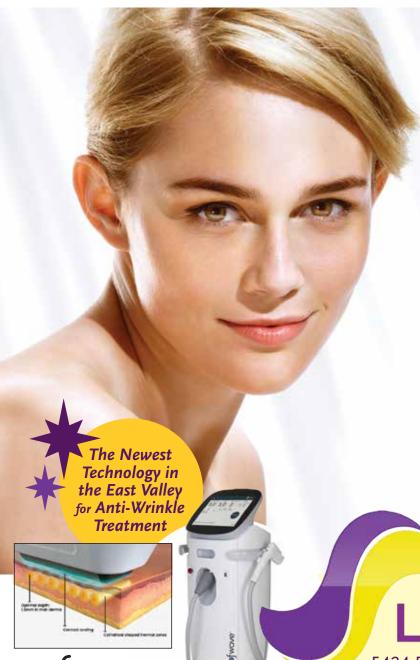
"This helps get rid of the dead skin and allows for better product absorption," Amanda said.

ollowing my own 10 years of **◀** tradition of writing articles in this publication (I cannot believe it has been that long), there is no real estate talk in December but some fun English traditions.



I want to thank everyone who reads my articles, those of you who have called me or visited my website, and all my amazing clients.

Boxing Day is a day steeped in tradition in England and was always my family's day to celebrate Christmas together. We would spend Christmas Day with our in-laws and on Boxing Day, our family would get together at my sister's house for leftover turkey, bubble and squeak (see recipe below), and the traditional English Christmas dessert of mince pies. Not only was it a great way to use up all the Christmas dinner leftovers, but it made getting together with family and friends so much easier over Christmas with two days to celebrate instead of just one.



WHEN IS BOXING DAY?

Boxing Day is Dec. 26 and like Christmas Day, it is a public holiday in England.

WHAT IS BOXING DAY?

It originated in the United Kingdom and is celebrated in a number of countries that previously formed part of the



British Empire.

There are many theories as to the origin of Boxing Day however, they all include the giving of a Christmas Box.

GIFT FOR TRADESMEN

In Britain, it was a custom for tradesmen to collect Christmas Boxes of money or presents on the first weekday after Christmas as thanks for good service throughout the year. This is mentioned in Samuel Pepys' diary entry for Dec. 19, 1663.

TO PROTECT SHIPS

During the age of great exploration, when great sailing ships were setting off to discover new land, a Christmas Box was used for good luck. It was a small container placed on each ship while it was still in port. A priest would place it there, and to ensure a safe return crewmen would drop money into the box. It was then sealed and kept on board for the entire voyage.

If the ship came home safely, the box was handed over to the priest in exchange for the saying of a Mass of thanks for the success of the voyage. The priest would keep the box sealed until Christmas, when he would open it to share the contents with the poor.

TO HELP THE POOR

An *Alms Box* was placed in every church on Christmas Day and worshippers would place a gift for the poor of the parish. These boxes were opened the day after Christmas.

Good King Wenceslas is a popular Christmas carol that tells a story of Good King Wenceslas braving harsh winter

weather to give alms to a poor peasant on the Feast of Stephen, the second day of Christmas, Dec. 26.

THE SERVANTS' CHRISTMAS DAY

Servants of the wealthy were allowed the next day to visit their families since they would have had to serve their masters on Christmas Day. The employers would give each servant a box to take home, containing gifts, bonuses, and sometimes leftover food.

TRADITIONAL BUBBLE AND SQUEAK

This is the ultimate for leftover mash and vegetables, and trust me, it is so good.

- Olive oil
- Two tablespoons unsalted butter
- Leftover mash potatoes

are golden and crispy.

- Leftover cooked vegetables, such as carrots, rutabaga, turnips, parsnips, brussels sprouts, cabbage, or anything

you have left over. Halve brussels sprouts and slice larger vegetables.

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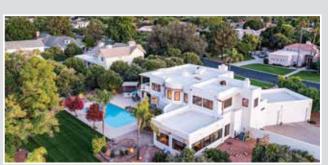
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Self Development Academy Students DEFY NATIONWIDE LEARNING LOSSES

t Self Development Academy, I have been given many opportunities including the opportunity to start middle school at age 10. I have been able to learn at my own level. I sometimes do not even realize that I am learning material that people at other schools do not see until high school or college because I have been learning content two grade levels above my own since I was seven years old. I now have an opportunity to go to high school and take college courses earlier than other people," said Nia Jebaraj, a 7th grader.

Educators, leaders, parents, and students knew that the year lost to the pandemic would include learning losses — *significant losses*. The Brookings Institute, a think tank, studied the learning losses over time. The picture they paint is *grim*.

The think tank used the word to editorialize, providing emotionally evocative adjectives to data. Yet, the 50 percent drop in math, and an almost equally significant drop in reading, cannot be described in words other than grim or bleak.

Grim indeed. But not ubiquitous. We will share what we see at Self Development Academy (SDA) and more importantly, what we are doing to lessen the loss of learning. Fortunately, we escaped the gravity of falling test scores as reported by many sources, including *The Washington Post*.

The lost year to COVID was not repeated at SDA, not just because of our staff, but also because of our students. It is a matter of two simple principles: reciprocal kindness and classroom-led discussions facilitated by the teacher. I guess what we are saying is that there is an instinct that no matter how dire our world can be, children's guiding psychology development will always tend toward goodness and self-development. Simply, it is the human will to be wise.

SDA is run by learned researchers. When COVID demonstrated pockmarks in our system, an audit of our program was in order. We concluded soon after that two programs would work best based on agency and kindness.

With agency, the teacher is a facilitator, the classroom is a symphony, and the students are motivated to become critical and creative thinkers. And by emphasizing kindness, our program slowly retrains students to exhibit self-regulated behavior, reinforced positively by peers who provide compliments to their classmates for displaying the very behavior.

PART I: THE PEER PROGRAM (POSITIVELY ENHANCED EDUCATION THROUGH RECIPROCITY)

We noticed immediately an important similarity between last year and this year — demeanor. Children this year were displaying all the same chair poses they did last year at home. The current year's behavior in-person or COVID year behavior remotely was similar: not tracking the speaker, legs not on the floor, and iteratively tapping pencils.

Children spent an entire year learning that they were able to determine what they were going to do during the day. With less engaging material, there were fewer reasons to pay attention to academic learning.

How are we fixing this at SDA? Combining basic psychological principles of peer identity reinforcement, positive reinforcement, and reciprocity, we came up with a game plan where peers celebrate each other's behavior changes, with the goal of a perfect learning environment. It is called our PEER Program (Positively Enhanced Education through Reciprocity).

PART 2: THE CLASSROOM AS A SYMPHONY

At SDA, we desire brilliant discussions in our classrooms. For that, we need dynamic, probing teachers who see the classroom as a symphony, each instrument as an ability level, bringing up the lower performing students to

introduce concepts, and higher performing to answer the difficult questions. Such an environment is not found in elementary schools but is ubiquitous in law schools and graduate schools.

If you see children as instruments in the classroom, the classroom as a symphony, and the teacher as a conductor, such a metaphoric mental framework enables what psychologists call the *Zone of Proximal Development* (ZPD). ZPD is a term developed by a transformative psychologist whose theory states that the best type of learning is done when the teacher is far enough away to allow the child to learn and think but close enough in case it is impossible.

We make learning fun and engaging as evidenced by students' tendency to raise their hands and excitedly standing up with their raised hands. The more engaged children are, the higher their bodies go in elevation.

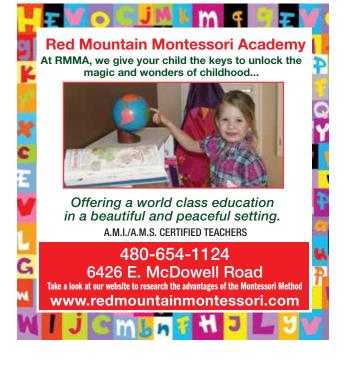
This year, at SDA, we are seeing student learning growth greater than previous years. Our kindergarten students are already reading fluently and with expression in Ms. Haschke's class. Our full class of 6th-grade students are motivated to take on the challenge of Algebra I, and some of our 8th-grade students are enjoying Algebra II.

Our students are eager to learn and gain knowledge. Thanks to SDA's two programs: kids complimenting each other and handing over learning to children while making sure teachers are there to push, prod, and probe to the penultimate.

Yes, it was a pandemic year last year. Yet, the environment at SDA is an exception. Students' learning rest on what ultimately makes for a happy human being — Agency and Kindness. ■

Why Zillow Valuations Were Never Right in the First Place

iven the market intensity of this year, it seems like a good time to talk about market value and how it is determined.

Let's start with a quick exercise. If we asked you what the price per cart was at Costco,

could you answer the question? Would \$500 per cart be a deal or a rip off? You might say it depends on what is in the cart. Is the cart filled with meat or macaroni? Wine or grapes? Televisions or tortillas?

During March of 2020, a cart full of toilet paper might have been worth more than a cart full of movie tickets. We all know the price of anything is dependent not only on the item itself, but also on the perception of the value of that item in the marketplace — which is determined by supply, demand, mood, and motivation.

When Zillow started with property valuations years ago, we saw that their values were wildly inaccurate two identical houses next door to one another could be hundreds of thousands of dollars apart in price. In fact, in 2016, it was no surprise when Zillow CEO Spencer Rascoff sold his own home for 40 percent less than the Zestimate.

Today, Zillow reports that 99 percent of their Zestimates are within 20 percent of the sales price. Sounds pretty good, right? Let's break that down for a moment on a \$500,000 property that is a range of \$100k on either side. In all our years in the business, we have yet to meet a buyer or seller who is good with that spread.

Value is based on the eye of the beholder, and, over the past few years, everyone has used Zillow so frequently that they started to believe what they saw on the screen. We, the viewers — who found Zillow particularly addictive in an increasing market — gave Zillow credibility through our clicks and views.

Many homeowners trusted the Zillow values so much that they sold their homes to iBuyers and investors based on a Zestimate, leaving enormous amounts of money on the table in the hottest market of all time. No appraisals were conducted so there were no checks or balances. The investors knew sellers would believe Zillow and so they structured their offers accordingly and made a nice profit along the way.

Real estate is a business of nuances. Selling a house is not like selling anything else. Many people think value is only based on the obvious factors: location, number of bedrooms, square footage, garage size, etc. But value is also based on a huge number of less quantifiable factors that can positively or negatively impact the price of a home, including compass orientation, cabinet color, proximity to a freeway, condition of the neighbor's house, cleanliness, a political sign in the front yard, light fixtures, pet friendliness, baseboard size, smell, neighborhood amenities, Instagrammable vignettes, or simply the feeling. Buyers will buy or reject a property based on these factors alone.

The other great nuance is the state of the market. How many buyers are looking on a given week and how motivated are they? Did interest rates increase or decrease? Was the home overpriced or underpriced to start? How many other comparable homes are on the market?

And what about the personal state of the buyer or seller? Do they have to sell? Are they being transferred? Are they getting married or getting divorced? Are finances motivating a purchase or sale? These factors can all impact price to varying degrees.

Market value also depends on national trends and confidence. In 2019, no one wanted a home office, home gym, or home theater. By the middle of 2020, buyers wanted two home offices, room for a Peloton, and a second family room for their kids. Homes that had those features received a premium, but maybe in a year or two they won't any longer.

Similarly, chatter about an impending housing and/ or stock market crash impacts confidence and market strength, independent of actual market conditions. National elections, state laws, tax codes, gas prices, weather, forest fires, job opportunities, and politics can all



So, given all these nuances, there is no way a Zestimate will ever be right.

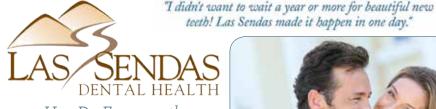

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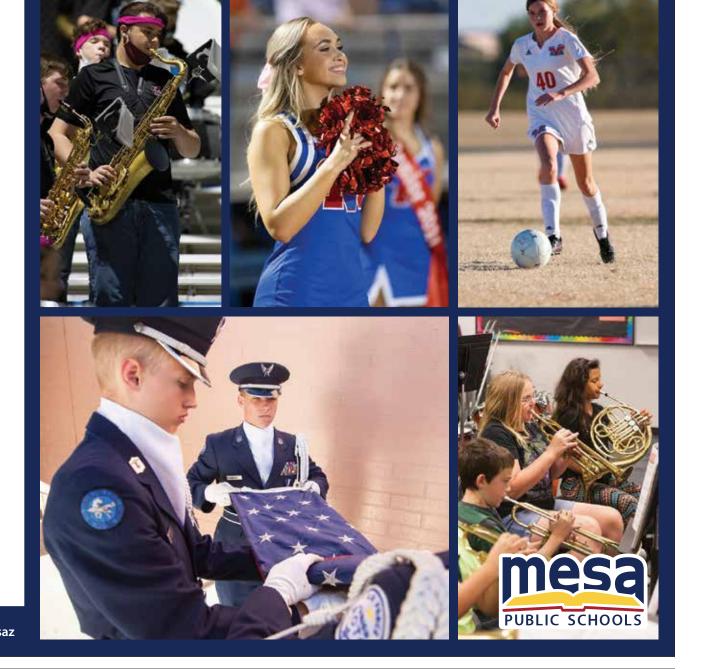

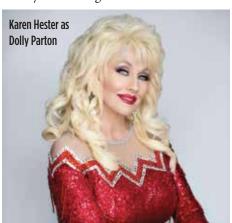

id you know that people representing Medicare plans aren't allowed to come to your home uninvited to sell or endorse anything?

They cannot call you unless you're already a member of the plan. If you're a member, the agent who helped you join can call you.

Also, they cannot require you to speak to a sales agent to get information about the plan.

As I have mentioned, my husband is turning 65 in January of next year. He has received numerous telephone calls from people claiming to want to help him with Medicare.

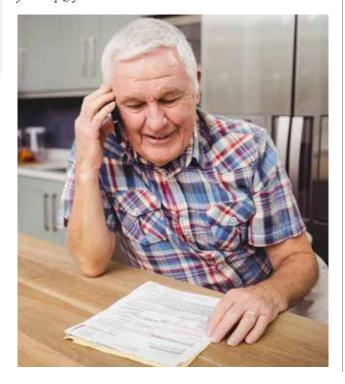
