

Looking Ahead: Check out our 2022 REAL ESTATE PREDICTIONS

In our annual forecast article published here in January of 2021, we stated that, "Waiting is not going to benefit potential buyers this year." This statement rang truer than we could have ever imagined over the past 12 months.

Last year, we predicted that inventory would be tight and interest rates would be historically low, but the incredible demand exceeded everyone's expectations. The real estate frenzy of 2021 resulted in the highest number of units sold since 2005 and price appreciation that is expected to reach 30 percent by the end of the year. In that process, 29 percent of buyers paid over list price, and 90 percent of homes sold within 30 days.

So, what can we expect in 2022? See our predictions below.

DEMAND WILL CONTINUE TO EXCEED SUPPLY

According to Realtor.com, in 2022 more than 45 million millennials will be between the ages of 26 and 35, and in their prime homebuying age. However, as of mid-December, there were only 339,000 single-family homes on the market in the entire United States. If you look at this statistic alone, you can understand that we have an inventory challenge that will be around for many years to come. In Arizona, that crunch has been compounded by the increasing numbers of people moving to our state.

Result: Continuation of the seller's market, bidding wars, rising values, and more new home permits.

PRICES WILL CONTINUE TO RISE

Because so many buyers are expected to enter the market, prices will continue to rise due to a lack of inventory. Several local economists are expecting that we will see a 7 to 9 percent appreciation this year, but we anticipate that it will be closer to 10 to 12 percent.

We still have many buyers who did not have the opportunity to buy in 2021, and they will now be competing with another new crop of buyers coming to market.

Result: Affordability issues will exclude many from the opportunity of achieving homeownership. Locals looking to move will face increasing competition.

INTEREST RATES WILL RISE

In 2022, the U.S. Government's voracious appetite for mortgage-backed securities kept interest rates low. However, rising inflation has now led the government to taper those purchases — which is already leading to higher interest rates.

Additionally, the Fed has indicated that there will be three interest rate hikes this year. By the end of 2022, we anticipate that mortgage rates will be hovering around 4 percent.

Result: Buyers will get less for their money or will be priced out of the market. Refinances will decline and people with low rates in place will have less incentive to sell.

SPRAWLING GROWTH — "DRIVE TO QUALIFY"

Limited inventory and rising prices in Metro Phoenix will continue to motivate homebuilders and buyers to go further afield to find their next opportunities.

D.R. Horton Inc. and Brookfield Residential Properties just purchased 2,783 acres in Pinal County for \$245.5 million and they are planning to develop a master-planned community with 10,000 homes. Lennar Homes is planning to have 13 active communities in Pinal County within the next year and another 3 to 4 new communities in Casa Grande in the next 18 months.

Meanwhile, homebuilders have purchased thousands of acres near the massive new Taiwanese Semiconductor Manufacturing Co. plant which is under construction at the I-17 and the Loop 303.



Buyers will have to drive further to find affordable options and builders will continue to pave the way.

Result: New areas will spring out of the desert while the existing stock of housing closer into the city will age. Expect to see more flips and remodels in areas that are closer to the city.

LUXURY LIVING

The pandemic has definitely changed the way we live and work, and that has motivated homebuyers to seek more expansive properties. As work from home continues into 2022 for many companies, the home office with a strong internet connection has become as necessary as a kitchen.

Arizona's economic expansion has also come with an influx of out-of-state buyers who have a strong appetite for luxury property. Part of the attraction is the amount of value that our luxury properties offer compared to more expensive markets in Washington, California, and Illinois.

Result: A greater demand for 5000+ square-foot homes. A willingness to fully renovate older luxury properties. More luxury-focused entertainment, retail, and restaurants in the Valley.

EXPLOSIVE ECONOMIC GROWTH

The Arizona economy is hot — not just in the real estate arena, but across sectors. Businesses are flocking to the Valley in search of new opportunities and an environment that is real estate, tax, and regulatory friendly. It is anticipated that Arizona will create more than 700,000 new jobs in the next decade.

"Our economy's momentum continues to accelerate. Arizona has emerged as the destination for key high-tech, high-wage industries like semiconductors, electric vehicle manufacturing, startups, and more," said Governor Doug Ducey. "Over the next decade, Arizona will remain a leader in the U.S. for people, businesses, and jobs moving to our state."



Result: A strong diversified economy with increasing wages and solid job opportunities across sectors. A broad tax base, more business opportunities, and maybe even better restaurants!

As Tuynke was growing up in Chile, a relative who was also interested in the beauty industry opened several salons and later a school where Tuynke's mother and her




siblings attended to study the art of beauty. When Tuynke turned 18 years old, it was the inspiration and support of her mother that led her to aesthetician classes.



The Prefrontal Cortex and Mindfulness

t Self Development Academy, our philosophy emphasizes the importance of self-awareness, selfknowledge, and self-acceptance. This development, in part, depends on the prefrontal cortex, which controls emotional regulation and executive function.

While the prefrontal cortex doesn't fully develop until around age 25, the earlier you can be intentional about your child's self-regulation, the better. According to the George Lucas Educational Foundation, "Preschoolers who exhibit self-regulatory behaviors go on to experience more success in school and are more likely to avoid risky behaviors in adolescence than their peers who have a hard time with self-control."

Children of any age will benefit from parenting that helps them flex those prefrontal cortex muscles, so to



speak, through self-reflection and self-regulation. Try these tips for engaging the prefrontal cortex and mindfulness.

BE CURIOUS

When your child exhibits strong negative emotions or erratic behavior, don't let your response end with correction and discipline. Go several steps further with him. Help your child be curious: Where is this emotion coming from? Do I feel it in my body? What triggered my response? When have I felt this way before? What need do I have that's not being met?

BREATHE DEEPLY

A lot can be said for taking a deep breath. It helps your child slow down, focus inward, increase blood flow, and according to Harvard Medical School, reduce overall stress. Even taking 20 to 30 seconds to breathe deeply throughout the day and not just in times of stress can be very beneficial.

PRACTICE GRATITUDE

It can be all too easy to focus on goals, devices, future plans, past regrets, and any number of things just beyond our reach. But making a list of things for which your child is grateful helps to bring her into the present moment. It ushers in contentment and peace not found in the hustle of a life without gratitude.

MOVE THE BODY

The mind's connection to the body can't be ignored. Encourage your child to listen to his body and get the kind of exercise and movement that he most enjoys. Whether it's a slow, meandering walk or a sprint, dancing to music or lifting weights, stretching at night before bed or playing soccer, the best movement is the kind that your child wants to do.

A mindfulness program is not the only area of focus in our early childhood and K-8 programs. Research confirms that children who attend pre-K programs with a more academically based curriculum are much more likely to



succeed in school than pre-K with more tepid programs. The studies have found that children who attend these preschools outperform peers who attended less rigorous preschools on both literacy and math.

After moving to Arizona, I continued my music activities, performing with community orchestras at the Mesa Arts Center, Scottsdale, and Chandler Center for the Arts. As a certified teacher, I taught school at Dobson High, Heritage Academy, and Mountain View High, as well as serving as the viola and violin instructor at Chandler Gilbert Community College.

Music has taught me so much. I have learned patience, persistence, confidence, and most of all, a love for music of

Mesa Public Schools Bond Dollars at Work

Txciting things are happening at Mesa Public ■ Schools as the district's master plan creates schools ✓ of the future. Thanks to funding from the 2018 voter-approved bond, schools across the district are receiving much-needed improvements.

For the past decade, Mesa Public Schools has undertaken efforts to align district facilities to support the needs of students. 2021-22 school year projects include modernized classrooms and open learning spaces to encourage student collaboration, in addition to continued cafeteria and kitchen remodels, and front office security updates.

DEFINING THE FUTURE

Scott Thompson, assistant superintendent of business and support services, shares that community input was vital to the master planning process. The district had several conversations with the community to determine what they wanted for their children.

As a result, the district focused on projects supporting the district's Portrait of a Graduate and its framework to ensure all students graduate ready for college, career, and community. Projects completed during 2020-21 at Dobson and Westwood high schools allowed the district to continue with upgrades at Mesa and Mountain View high schools in 2021-22.

"We wanted to improve the student experience," Scott said. "Our community told us they wanted to focus on improving supporting structures for things like fine arts,





athletics, and Career and Technical Education (CTE) programs. Other areas of concern were the length of time it takes for a student to walk from one end of the campus

At Mesa High, a new SciTech building and reorientation of softball fields, tennis courts, and practice fields will make it easier for students to navigate campus. Moving the front office addresses potential security issues, making the campus safer for all.

At Mountain View High, updates include performing arts and media center modernizations, office and classroom updates, and new outdoor areas for students to promote collaboration.

These upgrades change the way students experience education, by creating collaborative and secure spaces.

According to Superintendent Andi Fourlis, the district purchased 26,000 devices with bond dollars and 6,000 antennas at all district campuses to ensure schools have safe and reliable internet. Another \$2 million replaced outdated classroom projectors with more cost-efficient large screen monitors, so both teachers and students can project lessons and assignments.

"Having the spaces to support the use of technology in the classroom is important," Andi says. "Students collaborate differently, and it has a huge impact on engaging students in learning."■

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




What is ESG? And Why Do I Keep Hearing About It?

he investment world is full of acronyms and buzzwords, and right now you keep hearing about ESG, CSR, SRI, and several others. What do these acronyms mean and why do they keep coming up in news stories and web posts?



ESG stands for Environmental, Social, and Governance, while CRI stands for Corporate Social Responsibility, and SRI stands for Social Responsible Investing.

There are many other names and acronyms being used, but effectively they all are an evaluation of a firm's collective conscientiousness for social and environmental factors.

Environmental concerns such as climate crisis or sustainability (the depletion of raw materials or recycling programs and considerations in a company's products) can play a part in a firm's attractiveness as an investment.

Social concerns such as diversity in an organization's workforce, their commitment to human rights via where they outsource their supply chain, animal rights, and consumer protections can be considered.

Corporate governance takes into account the corporate behavior of the executives of an organization, measures the business ethics, anti-competitive practices, and corruption of the firm.

While the global pandemic has highlighted supply chain issues, growing concern about climate change has also influenced investor decisions and heightened engagement of groups previously less involved in traditional investing. This has contributed to the ESG investing boom.

Local, federal, and international regulations have been in place for years and will continue to evolve to address current circumstances which affected organizations must comply with, but in addition to legally required commitments, firms are now evaluating their environmental, social, and governance in a way to determine how it affects their attractiveness to investors.

ESG does not appear to be a trend in investing, it is something entirely different. It is an evolution of investment strategy itself. There has been a shift in how companies and investors view ESG factors and the importance they attach to them relative to other investing

considerations. Many companies are looking to do more to incorporate ESG considerations into their business strategies to strengthen their bottom lines and to raise their profiles with investors.

A recent paper titled *The Cost of ESG Investing* by ASU finance professors Laura Lindsey, Seth Pruitt, and Christoph Schiller found that even as interest in ESG mandates grows, ESG strategies have little to no impact on investment returns. ESG tilted portfolios do not perform significantly worse than non-ESG portfolios, but as ESG scoring becomes more standardized, returns of ESG tilted portfolios could surge due to the coordination from the markets or regulations.

According to the Forum for Sustainable and Responsible Investment, U.S. assets under management using ESG strategies grew to \$17.1 trillion at the beginning of 2020. That's a 42 percent increase from \$12 trillion at the beginning of 2018.


