THE FIX DRIVE THRU COFFEE serves up fresh options for everyone

→ he Fix Drive Thru Coffee is not just for your morning coffee run anymore. Known for its java on the go, friendly service with a smile, uplifting message, and overall positive vibes, The Fix is serving healthy food now too.

"We offer blueberry and gluten-free banana nut muffins, a snickerdoodle cookie, and a raspberry oat bar," said Stevie Stewart, overseeing manager of The Fix's locations in Tempe and Mesa.

In addition to the muffins, they also offer three types of gluten-free oatmeal through a partnership with Noble, a local bakery.

"I am ordering food every couple of days to keep it fresh," Stevie said. "The muffins are really popular."

Food is a bit of a new entrée for The Fix, but not nearly as fresh as their new, locally roasted coffee called The Heartbeat Blend, which they are now labeling and selling themselves through a partnership with a local roaster. Stevie said sales of this smooth, nutty Brazilian roast have been on the rise since customers discovered it and are especially excited that they can buy a bag to enjoy in their own kitchen.

"We have had good feedback on now being able to brew it at home," Stevie said. "It's cool because it's local and we can have it fresh."

The Fix Drive Thru Coffee is a family affair. Stevie and her brother Hunter, who had the idea to start a coffee stand, keep both locations humming with coffee and food. Mom and Dad (Matt and Darcy) work behind the scenes, as parents often do, to make sure both stores have the

items they need and stay ahead of demand.

The Fix is still the local go-to for your morning shot of caffeine, no matter how you choose to get it, and customers have been choosing different methods as the options expand.

"We have a plant-based energy drink that is extremely popular," Stevie said. "It is a more natural energy drink that doesn't leave people with jitters or some kind of weird after-effects that other energy

She said the energy drinks are made from green coffee and still have the same amount of caffeine that a traditional energy drink does, without the downsides.

A new month means a new list of drink specials at The Fix. Whether it be coffee, tea, or one of those energy drinks, Stevie says customers look forward to trying something new. There are at least three on the list.

"We mix it up every month," she said. "We have one in March, and we are naming it the Nutty Irishman. It is a Hazelnut Irish cold brew with crème."

When the Stewarts opened their first stand in Tempe, they adopted the motto Satisfy Your Soul. Beyond serving popular drinks and food, at which they have become extremely efficient and popular, The Fix still has the same mission that it had four years ago when it opened.

Stevie said they still live by that motto and take it seri-



ously, striving to make a difference every day, even if they are just serving a cup of coffee to someone rushing through the drive-thru on their way to work or running errands.

"We believe that we have something to offer people," she said. "Whether that be to just kick start their day or to have genuine conversation and relationship, we want our customers ultimately to feel noticed and wanted."

The Fix is also very involved in the community that it serves. Take Doggy Days for instance, when The Fix donates a dollar to a local animal rescue for every dog that comes through the line, with their human in tow of course.

They also routinely have a presence around town, such as their recent appearance at Sunshine Acres Children's Home. Stevie credits community involvement with helping The Fix weather tough times, especially during the pandemic, when the economy came to a screeching halt.

"We try to stay relevant to our communities in both Tempe and Mesa. We really have a local feel, and I feel like people are really attracted to that," she said. "We know they have a choice to go anywhere for their coffee and they are choosing us, and we try to provide excellent service."

Why the Arts Matter

At Self Development Academy (SDA), we focus on the arts, starting with our very youngest students.

Our toddlers at Self Development Preschool — a privately run school in Mesa — dance, sing, paint, and explore the world through their senses. Older students at SDA participate in music programs, including percussion and violin, as well as art classes, cultural field trips, and extra-curricular activities and clubs that integrate the arts with learning.

There are so many studies on why the arts matter. The Wallace Foundation works nationally to foster equity and improvements in learning and enrichment for young people. They rounded up resources and reports to help educators improve and expand access to the arts, especially in low-income areas. According to their research, "the arts generate a range of benefits for people and society, from bringing individuals pleasure and expanding their horizons to helping communities build stronger social bonds."

SDA agrees. As a school based on the belief that education should be rich with exploration, discovery, and connections to everyday life, we make the arts a priority.

Consider these benefits of art appreciation to children and adults alike.





ART ENABLES SELF-EXPRESSION AND COMMUNICATION

Regardless of age, artists memorialize, celebrate, lament, and capture a moment or idea to share with their audience. Children sing songs when they are happy. Or scribble wildly when they are angry. Or make playdoh hamburgers just like mom made for dinner last night.

The act of creating art is a full-body experience. While the brain is firing up thoughts and ideas, hands tickle the ivory keys or dab paint. Ears tune in to melodies or deep breaths take in a fresh box of crayons. Observing a painting of an orange can elicit smells in the viewer, who might imagine exactly how it feels and tastes. Or a song composed by a heartbroken musician can bring a listener to tears.

ART CULTIVATES A POSITIVE WORLDVIEW AND OUTLOOK

When children learn to appreciate a piece of music or visual art, they find beauty and meaning in the work of art. Once we begin to recognize what we like about certain artists' work, we find examples and inspiration everywhere.

Even pain and tragedy can be used for good when they inspire pieces of art and unify the community in shared grief and healing. Consider war memorials that draw viewers from around the world or headstones made of beautiful marble and embellished with blooming flowers.

ART CREATES WELL-ROUNDED STUDENTS AND IMPROVES OUTCOMES ACROSS THE BOARD

Anyone can be an artist. We should all consider ourselves one, regardless of talent or skill. Appreciating others' art and creating our own uses both the left and right sides of the brain. We analyze, investigate, emote, ponder, and so

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Thinking about getting solar?

olar has become more popular over the past few years not only because we are becoming more aware of the impact of traditional energy on the environment, but because of the increase in utility bills. SRP

increased their rates by 2.2 percent in May 2019 and 4.7 percent in November 2022.

Now more than ever homeowners are looking for environmentally clean and cost savings energy, and solar fits the bill. But before you sign up for solar I did want to share a couple of things I discovered when I sat down with two solar companies to get bids for solar on my own home.

MISLEADING INFORMATION

Does solar increase your home value? Every solar company will tell you solar will increase your home's value and refers to Zillow or other companies' surveys that claim it increases your home value by at least four percent. However, don't let this be a deciding factor for you as this is very misleading.

I spoke with several appraisers to find out how they appraise homes with solar and if the value increased by four percent as claimed. They all said the same thing — no.

First, an appraiser will give zero value to a system that is financed or leased. They will only consider solar if it is owned and paid in full at the time of the appraisal. They compare homes with and without solar to see if homes with solar sold for a higher price. They all agreed while there is value to owned solar it's usually a few thousand but certainly not four percent.

So, if you are considering installing solar, don't let an increase in your home value be a deciding factor. While a buyer may be willing to pay more for solar it may not appraise for that higher price.

SYSTEM SIZE AND YOUR USAGE

After meeting with the first company, I was quite happy with what he showed me and was ready to sign up. Then I met the second company and realized there was a big difference in what each company was offering not only in price but in the type of system.

I would not have known this if I hadn't had two companies to compare. It's like that saying, "you don't know what you don't know," and that was so true when I looked

One company was only offering a solar system that would produce 40 percent of my energy needs while the other offered a system that produced 80 percent.

One company had my usage at eight percent higher than the other company, which would make a big difference not only in the size of the system I would need but also in the savings projection.

So, make sure you get proposals from two or more companies in writing so you can analyze the numbers and compare them side-by-side to make sure you are not only getting the best deal, but the best system based on your usage and potential savings.

PROS FOR HAVING SOLAR

- Do Homes with Solar Panels Sell Faster? Yes, studies have shown homes with solar sell 20 percent faster than homes without, however, that also depends on if the solar system is owned, financed, or leased.
- Better for the Environment We live in the state with the most days of sunshine, so we are the prime customers for solar. Solar power is generated through photovoltaic technology, which is natural, renewable, and clean. It does not involve burning any fossil fuels or emission of greenhouse gasses.
- Saves on Utility Bills Energy costs continue to go up, especially in the past couple of years, and are expected to continue to increase, especially in Arizona with the increase in population and businesses moving here. The

- cost of your solar will never increase and as the energy costs increase you will be saving more each month.
- Financial Incentives There are credits that can be used to reduce the cost of solar. Currently, the credits are:
 - Federal Tax Credit: 30 percent
 - State Tax Credit: \$1,000
 - SRP Rebate: \$250
- Owned Versus Loan or Leased Of course, the best pricing is based on paying for the system upfront and this will give you some increase in your home value but most homeowners finance or lease their solar.

When you finance solar the balance you owe will need to be paid off at closing so the solar company cannot have a lien against the home. This then becomes the same as selling the home with owned solar. While the appraiser

> will not add value to your home because it is financed, your realtor can notify the appraiser it will be paid in full at closing and the appraiser may adjust the value accordingly.

With leased solar, you have two options. You can pay off the rest of the lease prior to selling your home or during the closing process — this will then be

the same as owned solar. Or as most homeowners do, sell the home with the lease in place for the new buyer to take over the contract. This can be a bit more difficult as not all buyers want to take on a solar lease especially if there is still a long period left on the contract.




our ministries, we do our best to live out the mission of the Gospel and the mission of our church: To be a home to share God's Love and Grace.



Investing in a Recession

here is a good chance that we have entered into a modern-day recessionary economy or possibly we have been in a recession over the past year. Time will tell.

According to the National Bureau of Economic Research (NBER), recessions last on average 17 months going back to 1854. Using historical data, the NBER determines when a recession begins and ends. The NBER makes their determination based on indicators, including GDP, payroll employment, personal income and spending, industrial production, and retail sales.

Since 1980, the United States has experienced seven recessions if we consider we are currently in a recession. The prior six recessions lasted on average 10 months. So, what should you consider investing in, as you determine your investment timeline, your financial goals, and your overall risk tolerance? Allocating a portion of your investment funds into multiple different asset classes based on the above three considerations will help you reduce the risks associated with investing.

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

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
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
