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It's October and Time to Fall in LOVE WITH YOUR BACKYARD AGAIN

ctober is our favorite month for getting outside and finally enjoying our backyard after months of hot weather. Back in 2022, we replaced our grass with gardens and we have

been working on creating our own little oasis in the desert ever since. Here are some of the things we will be tackling in our yard this month.

Like so many people, we lost several plants during the long hot summer and so the first item on the agenda is to clean up the yard and remove the dead plants. This is also the time to prune away the summer damage, just remember not to trim more than one-third of the tree or plant at any one time.

October is also the right time to clean out flowerpots and beds and top them off with fresh soil. If you are planting garden beds or container gardens, we recommend *Arizona Worm Farm Compost* in advance of planting. Their dirt is full of nutrients and worm castings, and we can definitely tell the difference.

ADJUST WATERING SCHEDULES

As the weather cools down, be sure to adjust your watering schedules. Too much water can cause leaves to yellow and can even drown your plants. Just watch carefully as there can still be hot stretches in October that require some hand watering in between regular watering schedules. A moisture meter is a great tool to help you guide your watering.

FERTILIZE

After the long hot summer, your plants are hungry and October is the perfect time to fertilize everything in your yard. For flowers and plants, we like to use *Ferti-Lome Fish Emulsion Fertilizer* which has a 5-1-1 formula (five percent nitrogen, one percent phosphorus, one percent potassium). While fish emulsion is mild, it is also fast-acting, and we have seen tremendous results from using it in our garden and around our yard.

We use fish emulsion once per month and then balance it in between with *GrowMore Organic Seaweed*



Extract. Citrus needs extra nitrogen, so make sure you are using a fertilizer specifically for citrus. The only citrus trees that should be fertilized in October are your lemon and lime trees. Other citrus trees should be fertilized in the spring months.



PLANT

This is the fun part. October is the dream month for planting trees, shrubs, and bushes. You want to plant them early so they have three full seasons to get established before the stress of the next summer. October is also the time to plant garden beds and container gardens.

We are loading up our garden with fresh herbs, kale, sugar snap peas, celery, garlic, leeks, radishes, carrots, beets, onions, arugula, spinach, and several kinds of lettuce. We have been amazed at how much food we have produced each season.

It is also our favorite time of year to refill our flowerpots with geraniums, nasturtiums, petunias, Johnny jump-ups, calendula, and snapdragons — to name a few.

OVERSEED

October is also the time to overseed and establish your winter lawn. There is nothing prettier than fresh winter grass, but when we redid our backyard, we decided to convert our grass to raised bed gardens and artificial turf. However, we never expected that our new yard (that produced food for our family) would also use a third less water.

If you are thinking it might be time for a change in your yard, take advantage of the Mesa Residential Grass-to-Xeriscape Incentive Program. The program provides up to a \$1,000 incentive for the conversion of grass to low-water-use plant coverage and up to \$100 for adding an eligible tree. USE YOUR OUTDOOR SPACES

For years, we didn't really use our backyard. We didn't love the way it looked so it never drew us outside. In the past two years, we have put a lot of thought and effort into how we want to live outdoors. We have re-envisioned our outside spaces and made an effort to make sure the views out of our windows are aesthetically pleasing. Lots of *Pinterest* inspiration, magazine clippings, planting trial

and error, and a few great Offer Up finds are giving it the character we had hoped for all along.

If you are looking to get some inspiration for your yard, definitely visit Berridge Nurseries at 4647 E. Camelback Road in Phoenix. They have amazing plants, garden seedlings, a knowledgeable staff, and beautifully styled pots and accessories. For a crazy assortment of unique pots and plants, also consider a field trip to The Plant Stand of Arizona at 6420 S. 28th St. in Phoenix and pair it with lunch at The Farm at South Mountain.

We can't say enough great things about the advice we receive by following Angela Judd of GrowingintheGarden. com. Angela is a local Mesa urban farmer who provides daily tips on gardening in our climate. She also teaches classes at the Mesa Public Library and online. We are all lucky to have such an amazing resource at our fingertips.

According to research in the Blue Zones, gardening and yard work may very well help you live longer. Gardening is the epitome of the Blue Zones lifestyle with many people gardening well into their 90s and 100s. 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Current and Future State of SHORT-TERM RENTALS IN THE EAST VALLE

keep a close eye on issues concerning short-term rentals (STR), believing that intelligent regulation and the professionalization of the industry can help ensure that those who want to offer their properties can do so responsibly and positively, and be accountable to the communities in which they exist.

This article examines some of the past factors and conditions for those who want to offer their property as a short-term rental, the communities they're located in, and the future of evolving state and local regulations.

BACKGROUND: 2016 STR AZ LAW

Before 2016, Arizona faced a complex landscape of varying local regulations on short-term rentals. Some municipalities allowed STRs with minimal restrictions, while others sought to impose stricter measures to address concerns such as noise, parking, and the erosion of the residential character of neighborhoods.

Amid this regulatory uncertainty, the Arizona legislature enacted a law in 2016, known as the 2016 STR AZ Law, to establish statewide guidelines for short-term rentals. This law sought to strike a balance between the interests of property owners, the tourism industry, and the concerns of permanent residents.

SB 1350 was passed by the AZ Legislature, which authorized short-term rentals in Arizona and specifically prevented cities and towns from prohibiting, restricting, or regulating short-term vacation rentals. The law allowed homeowner associations (HOAs) and condominiums to enact their restrictions if they followed some general guidelines, creating a hodge-podge of restrictions and rules across the Valley.

RECENT AZ SUPREME COURT DECISION AND ITS IMPACT ON HOA RESTRICTIONS

With the enactment of the 2016 STR AZ Law, the regulation of short-term rentals continued to be a contentious issue in some communities. In 2022, the Arizona

> Supreme Court made a critical decision that questioned the authority of HOAs to create and enforce their own restrictions concerning STRs and placed limits on their scope.

The Arizona Supreme Court case, Kalway v. Calabria Ranch HOA LLC et al, raised substantial questions surrounding the authority of homeowner's associations (HOAs) to implement and enforce changes to their covenants, conditions,

and restrictions (CC&Rs). The Court's stance is explicit: CC&R amendments introducing affirmative obligations that establish new usage constraints must meet two criteria for enforceability — they must be both reasonable and foreseeable.

In simpler terms, this decision implies that HOAs cannot modify CC&Rs to introduce new obligations without prior notice in the original CC&R document, alerting owners to the possibility of such obligations. Importantly, as this ruling applies retroactively, HOAs are also prevented from enforcing any existing amendments that run afoul of the Court's criteria. This ruling bears significant weight, given that HOAs frequently amend their CC&Rs and subsequently enforce these changes with the presumption of their validity.

THE FUTURE OF SHORT-TERM RENTAL **MANAGEMENT IN ARIZONA**

Among this uncertainty, the League of Arizona Cities and Towns, a group of elected officials from 91 Arizona communities, submitted proposed changes the group

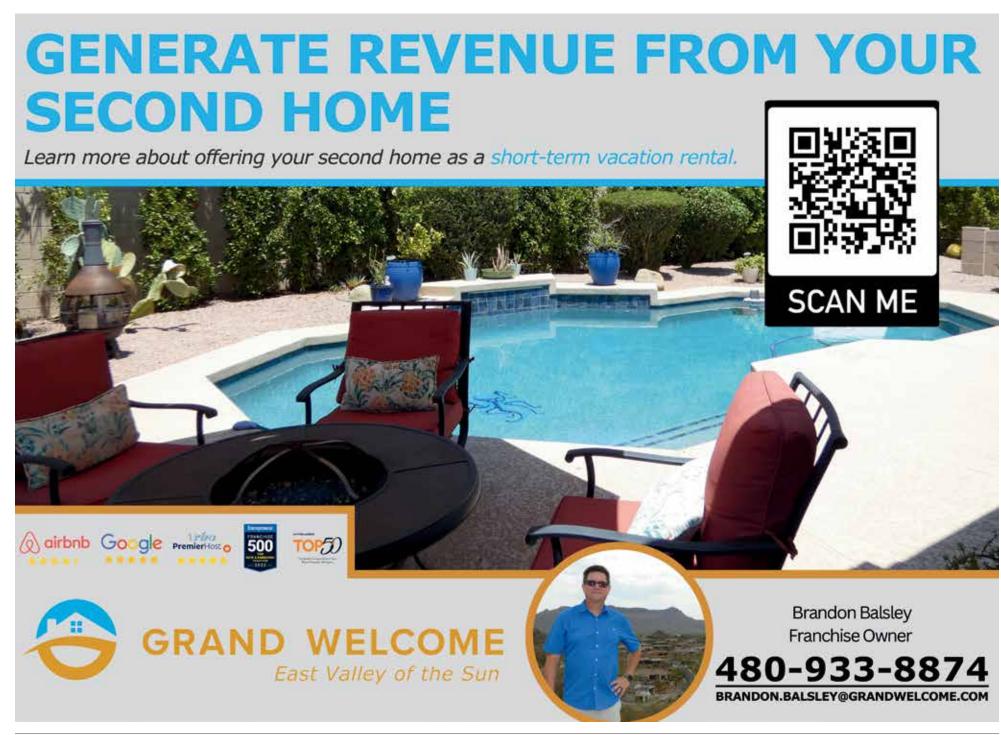
would like to see the AZ Legislature take up in the upcoming year regarding short-term rentals. The proposal includes three changes to state law:

- Enforce Local Housing Market Caps: Implement regulations that limit the percentage of available homes that short-term rentals can occupy. For instance, a city may consider imposing a cap of 10 percent on lessthan-30-day rentals, ensuring that the housing market remains accessible to long-term residents.
- Neighborhood-Specific Density Limits: Extend the regulation of short-term rentals to specific neighborhoods within a city. This approach ensures that areas retain their residential character and aren't overwhelmed by short-term rentals, preserving the sense of community.
- Mandatory Spacing Between Rentals: Enforce a minimum distance requirement between short-term rental properties. For example, cities can mandate that short-term rentals be at least three houses apart. This rule protects the quality of life for residents by preventing an overconcentration of rental businesses in one area.

Given this proposal, the 2016 STR AZ Law, and subsequent Supreme Court decisions, set the stage for the future management of short-term rentals in Arizona.

These factors have laid the groundwork for an evolving, regulated, and well-managed short-term rental industry here in Arizona. To balance the interests of property owners and local communities, we need a commonsense framework that allows for responsible growth in this dynamic sector. This ensures that shortterm rentals continue to contribute positively to the state's tourism economy while preserving the essence of its neighborhoods and communities. ■

Self Development Academy Offers

Two to Three Grade Levels Higher Accelerated Math Track

ne may ask what an accelerated math path means. To understand math acceleration, one must first understand the regular math path. The regular path for math is Algebra I in 9th grade, Geometry in 10th grade, Algebra II in 11th grade, and Precalculus in 12th.

Students desiring to attend competitive colleges or receive college scholarships take an accelerated math path. Those students who are usually focused on math-related subject areas such as engineering, computer science, research sciences, medical sciences, or finance need opportunities to take more challenging math classes in their early years so they may take advanced calculus courses and even statistics in high school.

These advanced math courses prepare students to take Advanced Placement (AP) exams, earn college credits in high school, become eligible to enroll in highly competitive colleges, and receive more scholarships.

To offer this challenging path, SDA, unlike other schools, does not use any special selective process other than the student's commitment to work hard and the ability to get good grades and do well in the subject. This egalitarian approach enables more students to participate in the accelerated path if they are willing to perform well at two to three grade levels higher.

ACCELERATED MATH IN ELEMENTARY

Normally, in most schools, it is difficult for elementary school students to progress into an accelerated math track. Only a select group of students qualify for accelerated math. However, at SDA, we pay special attention to students' interests and abilities in math as well as other subject areas.

This fall we have a class full of about 20 students in fifth grade who are accelerated in both math and language arts. These fifth-grade students are taking courses offered to SDA's middle school students, which include pre-Algebra, ninth-grade literature, and advanced science.

Fifth-grade students in the accelerated program are excited about taking middle school courses that are

challenging. Students excitedly share that they love the idea of a five-minute break after each 55-minute period. They love having different teachers come to their classroom and teach different subjects. As fifth graders, they take electives, and that, they say is cool.

This fifth-grade accelerated track enables the SDA students to take pre-Algebra in fifth grade, Algebra I in sixth grade, and Geometry and Algebra II in seventh and eighth grades, respectively.

TWO TO THREE GRADE LEVELS HIGHER **ACCELERATION**

This fall we have almost 15 students in eighth grade scheduled to take Algebra II. Remember, Algebra II in a regular track is taken in 11th grade. A significant number of students have been accelerated to take the course as eighth graders, three years ahead of their regular schedule.

When students take higher level math in middle school, they are able to take higher level and more honors and AP math classes in high school. This option opens many doors to take advanced sciences and literature courses as well. Not only will the students be graduating with a more rigorous curriculum, but also with a higher grade-point average. This enables them to graduate with a higher ranking in their senior class and have more opportunities for scholarships and admissions to more competitive programs at the college level.

The curriculum at SDA progresses at an accelerated pace. Although each student is unique, some students who start SDA in early grades — grade one or two — are ready to take the accelerated path of being two to three grade levels higher. If students start in first or second grades at SDA, some take Algebra I in seventh grade, which is two grade levels higher, while others are ready to take Algebra I as early as sixth grade, directing them to an acceleration path of three grade levels higher.

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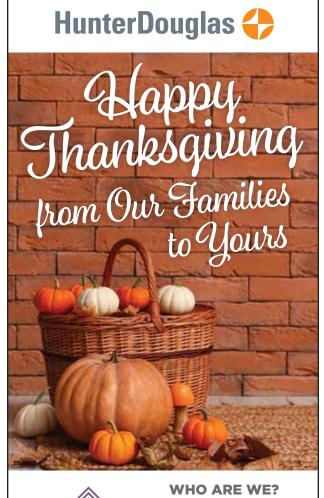
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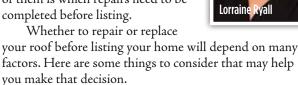
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Do You Need a New Roof or Just Repairs?

here are many things to consider before putting your house on the market. One of them is which repairs need to be completed before listing.



HOW DO YOU KNOW IF YOUR ROOF NEEDS TO BE REPLACED?

Tile roofs are the most popular in Arizona but it's not the tiles that fail, it's the underlayment. The tiles will last 50 years or more, but the underlayment has a life expectancy of 15 to 20 plus years (although some can last a lot longer). You can't just look at a tile roof and see that it is at the end of its life. Even if you know how old the roof is based on when the home was built it doesn't necessarily mean it needs to be replaced.

The underlayment can be in very different conditions from house to house depending on the quality of underlay-



ment used and the installation. Don't let anyone tell you it needs to be replaced just because of the age of your home — I have had several roofing companies tell me that on client's homes. An inspection is the only way to know for sure.

WHAT IS THE CONDITION OF YOUR ROOF?

Many roofers offer free roof inspections, and whether you are planning to sell or not, having a roof inspection every few years is the best way to stay on top of any potential issues and know the current condition of your roof.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN CHOOSING A **ROOFING COMPANY**

Ensure you use a licensed roofing company.

Have at least two or three companies come out to give you bids as they can differ quite significantly. As with most contractors, there can be a big difference in quality and integrity between roofing companies.

I recently had a roof inspection for one of my clients by three different companies and the difference between them was staggering. The first roofer said the main roof had three to five years of life left before the roof needed to be replaced, but the walk-out deck needed to be replaced immediately. Cost \$6,550. For a completely new roof it would be \$14,900. The second said the entire roof including the deck was fine and didn't need anything. The third roofing company said the entire roof needed to be replaced immediately at a cost of \$19,280. The buyer spoke to the two roofing companies who offered a bid and made the decision from there, but what a difference

Don't always go for the lowest price. One example a roofer gave me was another company under-bid him by \$1,800 for a small roof install. He later found out the cheaper company did not remove the old underlayment; they just laid the new underlayment on top of it. That saved the roofer the cost of labor to remove the old underlayment as well as disposing of it all. So, while they bid a cheaper price it came with poor-quality workmanship that would cost the homeowner more in the long run.



Make sure the roofing company offers a good warranty and, most importantly, make sure that it is transferable to the new owner when you sell.

Chances are, if your roof needs to be replaced, you have seen neighbors replacing their roofs. Ask them if they would recommend the company, check online, and read reviews, and one of the best ways to find a great roofing company is to ask a local Realtor. Realtors are a great source for referrals as we tend to know the companies that do the best work at the best price for all our clients.

CURRENT MARKET CONDITIONS

The market conditions can be a big factor in how much you need to do to your home before listing. We are currently in a seller's market with less supply than demand, giving the seller the advantage and therefore having your home in tip-top condition is not as important as it is in a

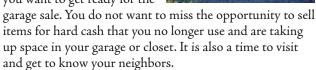
Garage Sale is Set for November

o you know why green leaves turn those brilliant colors in the fall? Ordinarily, every leaf contains brightly colored pigments, as well as green ones, but the deep green chlorophyll masks the others.

Chlorophyll plays an important role in making food for the tree. As shorter days and cooler temperatures signal the leaves to stop making food, they no longer need the chlorophyll, so it gradually breaks down, allowing the other colors to become visible.

Of course, there's a life lesson here. Just as we don't see those colorful pigments that are there all the time, behind any situation we may be facing right now is unseen goodness and beauty waiting to be revealed.

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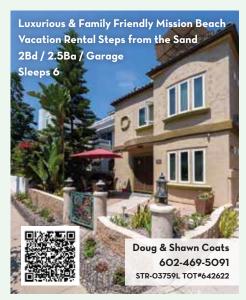


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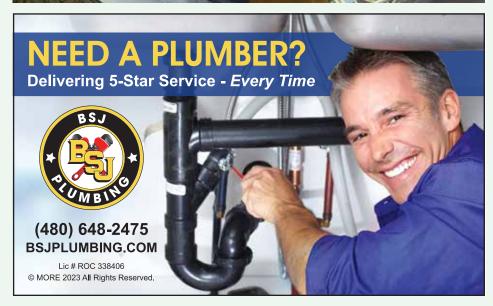












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
